River Project Plan Rejected

The Mt. Vernon flood control levees washed out by the Middle Fork of the Willamette River will not be restored by the government, Sen. Guy Cordon has wired County Judge Clinton Murd.

District engineers in Portland have recommended against restoration, the Oregon senator suggested, because it "would give local people false sense of security and could result in much greater damage than if levees were not restored."

Reason for the decision of the engineers, Cordon said, is the fact that the recent flood opened up high water channels both above and below the ends of the former levees, across which there is no authorization for construction of new embankments.

Cordon declared it the opinion of the district engineers that the real answer to flood control in the Mt. Vernon and Springfield area is the construction of the Meridian unit of the Willamette project on the Middle Fork above Lowell. He promised his assistance to obtain necessary appropriations for the dam when the War Department civil functions appropriation bill is taken up by the Senate Appropriations Committee.

Oregon Trail Scouts Attend Regional Meet

Five scouts from the Oregon Trail council participated in the first regional fellowship conference of the Order of the Arrow, national campers honor society, at Yakima last weekend, and John Banks of Eugene was selected as associate chairman of the 1947 conference.

The Order of the Arrow, which recognizes outstanding Boy Scout campers, is less than two years old in the northwest, where the local Tsigan Lodge was organized in March, 1944. There are now 12 lodges in this area. Two lodges were installed at the conference, bringing the total number of lodges in the United States to 300. The national organization is 31 years old.
