Russians Fire On U. S. Plane

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Govern-
 ment officials said today two
 Russian fighter planes recently
 fired on a United States patrol
 plane after it flew over the Sov-
 iet airbase area at Port Arthur.

These officials, who declined
 direct attribution, said some dam-
 age was done the navy plane, but
 none of the eight officers and
 men aboard was injured.

The navy is reported to have
 taken the matter up with Rus-
 sian authorities in the China area.
 The Russians are said here to
 contend that the American plane
 had no right to fly over the Port
 Arthur area, since it is a fortified
 zone. Consequently, they argue,
 the Soviet pilots were fully with-
 in their rights to open fire.

Best information here is that
 the American craft did not re-
 turn the fire. An official report
 may be issued on the affair. There
 have been a series of exchanges
 between Washington and Ameri-
 can naval commanders in the area
 about the incident.

U. S. to Import German Produced Hops

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The War
 Department told Senator Guy
 Cordon today the United States
 military government in Germany
 had received orders for 870 met-
 ric tons of hops to be exported to
 the United States.

Funds derived from the ship-
 ment will enable the Germans to
 pay for exports from this country,
 the department said.

Oregon hop growers complained
 to Cordon that importing hops to
 this country would injure hop
 prices because there had been a
 large carryover from last season.

The department said it was sug-
 gested Germans in the American
 Occupation Zone be permitted to
 manufacture beer but that after
 President Truman's statement
 about the food situation, the prop-
 osal was dropped.

Iowa Publisher Dies On 85th Birthday

DES MOINES, Iowa — (AP) —
 Gardner Cowles, Sr., publisher of
 the Des Moines Register and
 Tribune, died at his home last
 night on his 85th birthday. He
 had been in failing health for the
 last few years.

Cowles purchased the Des
 Moines paper, with a present
 daily circulation of 350,000, in
 1903. Under his direction, the
 paper received many national
 awards for all-around excellence,
 and three of its staff members
 won Pulitzer prizes.

Cowles, a personal friend of
 former President Herbert Hoover,
 was drafted during the banking
 crisis of 1932 to succeed Gen.
 Charles G. Dawes as middle west-
 ern director of the Reconstruction
 Finance Corporation.

Survivors include his widow,
 Florence, three sons and three
 daughters.

The sons are John Cowles, pres-
 ident of the Minneapolis Star-
 Journal and Tribune, Gardner
 Cowles, Jr., president of the Des
 Moines Register and Tribune,
 Look magazine and the Cowles
 Broadcasting Co.; and Russell
 Cowles, well-known New York
 painter.

The daughters are Mrs. David
 S. Kruidenier, Des Moines; Mrs.
 James D. Lecron, Berkeley, Calif.,
 and Mrs. Bertha Quarton, Cedar
 Rapids, Iowa.

WAC to Accept Reenlistments

Former members of the Wo-
 men's Army Corps who desire to
 return to military duty are being
 accepted now, and applications of
 former enlisted wascs should be
 submitted without delay, an-

 Army Recruiting Service, on the
 basis of information from the War
 Department.

Applicants accepted will be re-
 enlisted in the grade held at time
 of discharge, but they must vol-
 unteer to remain in service either
 for the duration plus six months
 or until Sept. 30, 1946. All vol-
 unteers must meet the standards
 applicable to enlistment in the
 war in effect in August, 1945, ex-
 cept that the age limit is raised to
 49, and they must waive all
 rights to discharge because of
 marital status or age.
