

AFL Wins Election At Toledo Sawmill

The American Federation of Labor scored a second victory in the lumber industry this week in a Thursday election at the C. D. Johnson sawmill, Toledo. This sawmill, reportedly, is Oregon's largest.

Of the 618 employees eligible for voting, 860 requested continued representation by the AFL, Lumber and Sawmill Workers Local 2720; 180 asked change to CIO leadership; and one voted no union representation. Eight votes were challenged, and two were void, making a total of 851 votes cast.

The petition for this election, according to Cecil P. Richards, secretary-treasurer of the AFL, Willamette Valley District Council, Lumber and Sawmill Workers, was filed by the International Woodworkers of America (CIO). The AFL also won a bargaining election at the Springfield Plywood Corp. plant Wednesday, by a 150-to-126 margin over CIO opponents.
