

13 Indicted By Grand Jury

The Lane County grand jury Wednesday returned indictments charging 13 persons of crime, returned not true bills against four individuals and returned secret indictments against five persons not yet apprehended.

Jury members also released a short report on generally satisfactory conditions at the Lane County Poor Farm and the Lane County Jail.

The following indictments were returned: Jack Russell Ruff, larceny in a dwelling house and illegal possession of a firearm; E. A. Mononoff, obtaining money under false pretenses; Esteban M. Villanueva, assault with a dangerous weapon; Emil Edward Wilson, possession of stolen property and larceny in a store; Robert Scheer, negligent homicide; Dean Merle Crocker, sodomy; Everett Stitt, assault and battery; Donald Kidd, contributing to the delinquency of a minor; Claude Carl Campbell, uttering and publishing a forged check; Oliver Emery Fuqua, possession of stolen property; George West, obtaining money under false pretenses; Emerson E. Ross, contributing to the delinquency of a minor; and

Lane School Children Examined by Doctors

Three doctors conducting a series of physical handicap clinics among Lane County school children are now holding examinations in Eugene at the Frances Willard school. They will continue through Friday, County School Superintendent Lucille L. Kennedy has announced.

In examining county children since February 25 the three, Dr. V. D. Bain, Mrs. Ethel Fortner and Dr. Leon Lassers, found 149 youngsters with defects in vision, speech or hearing. The clinics were conducted at Mapleton, Junction City, Cottage Grove and Springfield schools for all other districts in those areas.

Parents and teachers of the concerned children were notified of defects and recommended methods of correction.

The jury members, after an inspection of the poor farm under the management of Gordon Hoare, announced the establishment was found clean and well managed. At the suggestion of Hoare, however, it was recommended more adequate fire protection be provided. Chemical fire extinguishers or an adequate available supply of water were advised, as existing wells are not thought to be of necessary capacity. It was also requested the state electrical inspector be asked to inspect wiring thought to be inadequate. During high winds insulation has proved faulty between buildings.

The inadequate Lane County Jail is being run in as satisfactory manner as can be expected, the jury said, under Sheriff C. A. Swartz. Sanitary arrangements were similarly approved under existing circumstances.

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Red Cross Issues Appeal for Knitters

The yarn is here, the need for knitted garments continues to be urgent; and still no additional knitters have signed up at the local Red Cross chapter house, Mrs. Royal Glick, chapter production chairman, announced today.

Knitted work already underway should be finished immediately and yarn on hand should be utilized in every way possible, Mrs. Glick continued.

Red Cross Pacific area has a commitment pending for more than 60,000 pairs of slippers for servicemen in hospitals. The initial request continues to increase weekly and there is no surplus on which to draw, Mrs. Glick added. Because of the intense cold and snow in some occupation areas during the winter months, the need for heavy woolen garments is urgent. It is impossible for the army and navy to supply the demand, hence their request for Red Cross volunteer assistance.

Sweaters and socks as well as slippers, head the list of imperative needs in army, navy and veterans' hospitals, and there is a shortage also of kit bags, wash cloths and other comfort articles.

Local residents who can spare a few hours each week at the chapter house or who can knit at home are urged to call the American Red Cross, phone 63, for further information.

Senate Argues On Churchill

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statement that Churchill's proposal would "cut the throat of the UNO" and destroy the unity of the war-time Big Three. Criticizing what they termed "Tory clamor in Britain and the United States which is building up war," they said "the new British-American imperialism which Mr. Churchill proposes... simply makes the world situation intolerable."

Senator Ball (R-Minn.) commented that such an agreement "would obviously be interpreted by Russia as directed against her and with some justification I think." He added this would be almost certain to force the Russians into counter alliances.

Some on Capitol Hill like Senators Taft (R-Ohio), Edwin C. Johnson (D-Colo.) and Maybank (D-SC) agreed generally with the former prime minister's estimate of Russian aims. Churchill described these as a desire for "indefinite expansion" of Soviet "power and doctrines." None, however, saw a military alliance as the answer to that problem.

Moreover, Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said he thought a military arrangement between the United States and Great Britain would be likely to "precipitate the world against us."

Ickes had been ordered by the committee to produce memoranda about the "rawest proposition" statement, but the former cabinet member said he had received the committee's summons too late yesterday to get the originals out of a bank vault where he said they are under time lock.

WASHINGTON, March 6—(U.P.)—A drive got underway in the House Veterans Committee today to strengthen and toughen the proposed report on its investigation of veterans hospitals.

The committee undertook its investigation last year after several newspapers and magazines had denounced conditions in veterans hospitals.

The report on the inquiry was prepared by a five-man subcommittee and presented to the full committee last week. So far, because of the objections of several members, it has not been approved.

A foreign office spokesman made a point of insisting that Churchill spoke as a private individual, and the fact that he was opposition leader in parliament had no bearing on the matter. He said the speech was read at the foreign office with "the highest interest," but Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin did not see a copy of it before it was delivered.

The British press generally commented favorably on the speech, particularly concerning the urgency of getting a settlement with Russia on outstanding issues. The Communist Daily Worker assailed it as the start of an Anglo-American axis against Russia.

Truman Blasts 'Greedy' Men

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"decency and righteousness" to make full use of their war-won freedom to save a world beset by "threats of new conflicts, new terror and destruction."

Saying forces of "selfishness and greed and intolerance" are again at work, Mr. Truman declared that they create situations demanding "moral and spiritual awakening in the life of the individual and in the councils of the world."

Faith Needed

"There is no problem on this earth tough enough to withstand the flame of a genuine renewal of religious faith," the President said. "And some of the problems of today will yield to nothing less than that kind of revival."

Mr. Truman included in his address an appeal for food sharing "to save the starving millions in Europe and Asia and Africa."

Asks Church Lead

He said America's churches—Protestant and Catholic and the Jewish Synagogue—bound together in the American "unity of brotherhood," must provide the "shock forces" to accomplish the "spiritual awakening" necessary to substitute "decency and reason and brotherhood for the rule of force in the government of man."

"Oh for an Isaiah or a Saint Paul to reawaken a sick world to its moral responsibilities," he declared.

Unless the church forces provide the spiritual awakening in this atomic age, the President continued, "we are headed for the disaster we would deserve."

The President said that "every possible resource of government would be used to reach our goal of 2,700,000 low-cost homes within the next two years," and added:

For Future Good

"The spiritual welfare of our people of tomorrow is going to depend on the kind of home life which our nation has today."

"That is why it is so important that all churches throughout America cooperate in the national share-the-home effort. If each congregation of the 250,000 churches and synagogues in this country would open their spare rooms to only four veterans, one million veterans and their families could receive temporary shelter until new houses are available."

Asserting home life must conform to "an ever-rising standard," Mr. Truman declared:

"To raise that standard should be, and is, the constant aim of your government and the underlying basis of its policies. It would make the effort so much easier if people and nations would apply some of the principles of social justice and ethical standards which have come down to us from biblical times." He said that questions which beset the country "in strikes and wages and working conditions" would be simpler "if men and women were willing to apply the principles of the golden rule."

Respect Picket Lines

Although only 17 of the NFW's local unions have voted to strike, which would result in a work stoppage of 150,000, most of the other 100,000 members of the remaining 34 unions would respect picket lines and stay away from their jobs. An NFW spokesman said the strike would cause a virtually complete blackout of telephone service throughout the country.

Although results of the negotiations were not disclosed, the Long Lines Federation held to its demands for a wage increase of 18 1/2 cents an hour. The company, which earlier had offered a hike of 15 cents, was reported "ready to consider" a figure just under 17 cents.

TOKYO, March 6—(U.P.)—Emperor Hirohito issued an imperial rescript today "commanding" accomplishment of the new constitution which strips him of sovereign powers.

Text of the rescript follows: "Consequent upon our acceptance of the Potsdam Declaration that the ultimate form of the Japanese government be determined by the freely expressed will of the Japanese people; I am fully aware of our nation's strong consciousness for justice and its aspirations to live a peaceful life, promote cultural enlightenment and its firm resolve to renounce war and foster friendship with all countries of the world."

"It is therefore my desire that the constitution of our empire be revised drastically upon the basis of the general will of the people and the principle of respect for

the fundamental human rights. "I command, hereby, the competent authorities from the government put forth in accordance with my wish their best toward accomplishment of the end."
