Australia Floods Prove Disastrous

SAN FRANCISCO—(UP)—Ten
 persons have lost their lives and
 hundreds are homeless as the re-
 sult of floods which have inun-
 dated about 400 square miles of
 lowlands in northern Queensland,
 Radio Australia reported today in
 a dispatch from Brisbane.

The cyclone which brought the
 floods is now on its way from the
 Australian coast across the Coral
 Sea, the broadcast said, adding
 that there are signs of another
 disturbance which may bring more
 rain.

Arthur Drakeford, Australian
 air minister, has directed the Royal
 Australian Air Force to help pro-
 vide relief and reconnaissance.

 ating over the flood areas in co-
 operation with Queensland police.
