Recipe

Oyster and Shrimp Patties
½ pint oysters
Oyster liquor
Cream or rich milk
1 can shrimp
½ cup pecan meats
4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon pepper
¼ teaspoon paprika
Few grains cayenne
Patty shells
Clean and pick over the oysters and cook until edges curl. Drain. Combine oyster liquor and cream or rich milk to make one and one-half cups of liquid. Heat in a double boiler. Remove intestinal vein from shrimp. Shred the pecan meats and toast in the oven. Melt butter and blend in flour. Add oyster-cream liquor and stir and cook until thick. Season with salt, pepper, paprika and cayenne. Add the oysters, shrimp and pecans.

VEAL IN SHERRY
Purchase veal round or veal cutlets; pound meat until thin, and cut into pieces for individual serving; shake in sack with flour and salt, then brown on both sides in fat in shallow pan; cover with sherry wine, and let simmer for 40 minutes on low fire.

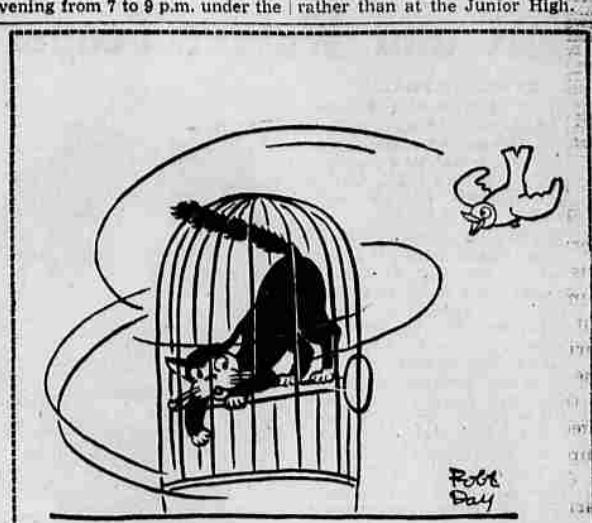
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FLY TYING
