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voting that the strike had been cancelled. Asked by newsmen if all union members would comply, he replied: "Absolutely."

Agreed Last Night

The agreement was worked out late last night following more than 31 hours of almost continuous conferences between representatives of the union, the telephone industry and the conciliation service.

Even so, the walkout wasn't definitely averted until Warren's announcement just 15 minutes before the 8 a. m. strike deadline. President Joseph Beirne was on the telephone during most of the early morning getting the approval of union locals for the settlement.

The union had cleared the way for the strike by filing a 30-day notice with the National Labor Relations Board as required by the Smith-Connally Labor Disputes Act.

Affiliates Involved

Only 17 NFW affiliates were directly involved but they included such big unions as the Long Lines Federation, Association of Communication Equipment Workers, Southwestern Telephone Employees Federation and other regional and state units.

Both sides were summoned to Washington Tuesday after wage negotiations in the key dispute between the long lines union and the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. collapsed in New York.

DON'T WANT WIVES?

FRANKFURT, March 7.—(AP)—American troops in Germany have responded slowly to an offer to have their wives join them, Army headquarters reported today. During the first 10 days of accepting applications, only 547 were received from the 15,000 men of the headquarters command. Of these, 528 were from officers and only 22 from enlisted men.

Need Sterner Laws

The Justice Department, meanwhile, informed the Senate Atomic Committee that tougher federal statutes were necessary to protect atom bomb secrets from foreign spies. In a report to the committee, it said that espionage on a wide-scale was possible in this country under present laws.

It urged the enactment of legislation that would impose maximum penalties of \$300,000 fine and 30 years imprisonment on anyone divulging atomic information. Under its proposals, violators of the security regulations would also be liable to a fine of \$100,000 and five years imprisonment.

Survey to Indicate Farm Outlook for Vets

Plans to conduct a comprehensive survey of opportunities for veterans interested in farming were formulated at a Tuesday joint meeting of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Council, the Lane County Veteran's Agriculture Advisory Committee, and the Lane County Farm Labor Committee.

The survey will be conducted in three areas of the county first with other communities being included at a later date. The Coast, Irving and Eugene areas were selected to be surveyed first. The three areas include about three-tenths of the county, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent, who is cooperating in the survey.

approved the article renouncing war, but added that "Although Japan now is in no position to start a war, it would be unfair for Japan alone to include this in her constitution."

"Other nations of the world, too, should prescribe renunciation of war in their constitutions," he said.

Emperor Same

Saito believed the document would mean little change in the emperor's status, explaining that "under the present constitution, sovereignty is in the hands of the emperor but he has not exercised it. The new constitution stripping the emperor of political power merely means putting the facts in black and white."

Sanzo Nozaka, Communist Party spokesman, said the new constitution was "a surrender to Japanese public opinion and the public opinion of democratic nations abroad, particularly the United States."

"It would be a wonderful thing if war could be abolished by inserting a clause in a constitution," Falls in Purpose

Nozaka said abolishment of the army, navy and airforce under the constitution actually "is no different, except in degree, to conditions imposed on Germany at the end of World War I. The only effective way to prevent war is to liquidate the warmakers—political and economic as well as military. This the present gov-

ernment has not done and is incapable of doing."

Sources close to MacArthur feel that the new constitution not only will work but will be successfully carried out by the Japanese after the end of the allied occupation.

They felt that the occupation will last long enough to get the constitution working under the guidance of new Japanese leaders who would be thoroughly indoctrinated before allied troops are pulled out.

Newspapers applauded it unanimously.

Premier Baron Kijuro Shidehara told the United Press that the drafting of the new constitution was a "Big job—I'm glad the task is over." He described the document as "very advanced" and said he was sure the people in general would approve it.

"I trust the Diet will pass it," Shidehara said.

Defense Opens in Coos Bay Mail Fraud Case

PORTLAND, March 7.—(AP)—James R. Barton, first to take the stand in his own defense in the Coos Bay oyster bed case, testified today that he had studied trade publications a long time before entering the business.

Barton, former Oklahoma City superintendent of schools, is one of four men charged with mail fraud in the promotion of oyster beds.

He told the court that he and Edgar Robert Errio, Salem, another of the defendants, took an option on some Tillamook Bay oyster land, and then gave them up in favor of beds at Coos Bay.
