Law Shoots It Out by Mistake

LOS ANGELES, Calif. (U.P.)—Police and Deputy Sheriff's mis- took each other for a county jail fugitive they were hunting today and shot it out before things were set right—with the result that one deputy was not doing any sitting.

It happened when the search for John Balpho Miles, who walked out of the county jail while no one was looking Monday, led three deputies and three police plain clothes men to the same house at about the same time.

The deputies got there first and went in.

The man of the house greeted the police when they arrived a few minutes later with: "Your friend's inside."

They thought he meant Miles and started shooting.

The deputies fired back.

Of 14 shots, the only one that took effect was in Deputy E. M. Renfro's posterior. The bullet was removed at County Hospital. Miles missed all the excitement. He had left a half hour earlier.

Carpenters Gain Boost in Wages

COOS BAY (U.P.)—Carpenter's wages in Coos, Curry, and Douglas counties were increased from \$1.37½ to \$1.55 an hour this week under a wage stabilization board order.

Frank Esterdahl, business agent for the Southwestern Oregon District Council of Carpenters, said the wage boost puts the craft on the same scale as Portland, Eugene and Medford workers.

Poultry Contest Aimed to Develop Better Chickens

Oregon poultry breeders, old or young, may participate this year in the early phases of a three-year national contest to develop the "chicken of tomorrow," announced Noel Bennion, extension poultryman at O.S.C. who is a member of the national contest committee. The object is to develop a better breed, strain or cross that will produce better meat for the consumer at greater profit for the producer.

The Oregon Baby Chick Association is sponsoring the state contest this year which will culminate in a dressed poultry show in connection with the annual meeting at Oregon State College late in June. No cash prizes will be given the first two years, but \$8000 is available for the final competition.

Each participant this year may enter from 50 to 300 chicks hatched between March 17 and 27, Bennion explains. These are to be identified at hatching time by leg bands or other acceptable mark. Records will be kept as to number started, mortality, and feed used.

These chickens are to be raised on the contestant's own farm to a uniform age to be announced later. They will be inspected during the growing season. At the age specified, 12 cockerels will be selected by the owner to be dressed and exhibited in the June show. Certificates of quality will be awarded to winners.

For the final third-year national contest, breeders will send eggs to a central hatchery where they will be hatched and raised under identical conditions. A \$5000 award will go to the breeder whose birds score the most points considering all factors.

Navy Adds 163,204 Since Jap Surrender

SEATTLE (U.P.)—U. S. Navy enlistments since the surrender of Japan total 163,204, 13th Naval District Headquarters announced today.

A total of 6,814 men were added to the Navy's rolls during the week of February 21 to February 27, the Navy said.

During that period the Navy accepted 5,341 first enlistments in the regular Navy, 966 transfers to the regular Navy from the reserves and inductees, and 507 regular Navy reenlistments and extensions.
