

Smaller Bread Loaf Against State Law

PORTLAND — (AP) — President Truman's Famine Emergency Committee suggestion to reduce size of bread loaves 10 per cent is in violation of Oregon law, a Bakers' Association attorney said today.

Ranson Meinke reported the state law sets loaf weights at one pound, one and a half pounds, two pounds or multiples of those weights.

At the same time, Larry Hilaire, president of the Restaurant Association of Oregon, said cafe owners would do "whatever they ask us if they convince us it is necessary to prevent widespread famine."

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Germans Built Plane To Bomb New York

LONDON — (AP) — A German plane built to reach New York with a 4,000-pound bomb load was described in the 1946 edition of Jane's all the world's aircraft.

Known as the Messerschmitt ME 164, the four-engine plane first flew in December, 1942, but never was developed sufficiently for Transatlantic bombing, the publication said.

Another plane described is the Junkers JU 287, first heavy jet-propelled bomber. It was to have had a sea level speed of 509 miles an hour and a range of 1,325 miles with a 4,400-pound bomb load. It never was developed beyond the prototype stage.

Lumber Firm Quits Linn County Operation

ALBANY — (AP) — Curtailment of logging operations in Linn County and a shift to the Coast Range west of Dallas to work over timber damaged by last summer's fires by the Snow Peak Lumber Co.

The firm, a Willamette Lumber Co. subsidiary, is installing equipment for its large holdings east of Foster. Cutting has halted in the Crabtree Creek area where operations began six years ago.

Alaska Reindeer Number 65,000

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A recent count of Alaska's reindeer showed about 65,000 in herds.

In addition, the Interior Department reports, there are thousands of reindeer in the territory which have strayed and are running wild over tundras where a roundup is difficult.

Reindeer are an important source of meat in Alaska.

Returned Vets Top Problems for USES

Job placements for returning veterans remain at the top of the problem list for the Eugene and vicinity labor market, according to a bulletin just released by the U. S. Employment Service in Eugene.

Urging employers to give jobs to veterans wherever possible, Donald F. Mattson, office manager, declared that the greatest proportion of these men are well-qualified for skilled and semi-skilled work. "Many of them are experienced and trained," he said, "and anxious to get back into the swing of civilian life."

Office records indicated 655 unemployed Lane County veterans at the end of February. The number of veterans returning to the county increased from 1195 in January to 1277 in February, as evidenced by number of discharge notices received at the office.

In spite of the fact that about 300 seasonal workers were laid off during the month, and more veterans returned to the area, the labor market bulletin estimates unemployment here at 1850 in February, a decrease from 2050 in January. Many of the seasonal workers have withdrawn from the labor market, and some veterans are interested in establishing their own business or returning to school, and are not now seeking employment, the report comments.

Approximately 400 of the unemployed are women, many of whom could be placed in lower-skilled employment than their wartime work, if they would accept the lower wages or were living in areas in which work is available, according to the bulletin.

Total nonseasonal job openings on hand at the end of last month were 271, nearly the same as at the beginning of the month, although 558 placements were made during February. Unfilled jobs for unskilled and service workers almost doubled, while semi-skilled and clerical and sales jobs decreased. Seasonal jobs were unavailable, although some poultry plants are expecting a small increase in workers needed about the middle of March.

King of Bikini Atoll Will Move to New Home

WASHINGTON, D. C. — (AP) — King Juda and his subjects, formerly of Bikini atoll, have a new address on Rongerik atoll, 109 miles from the scene of the atomic bomb tests.

The navy said that all natives on Bikini had been removed to previously uninhabited Rongerik, where the army and navy built new homes for them. The announcement said Juda and his 12 chiefs unanimously agreed to move "as their contribution to the advancement of science."

Rongerik is to the east of Bikini atoll and therefore upwind from the spot where the radioactive clouds from the atom bomb test will originate.

The Egyptian papyrus, "The Book of the Dead," written about 1500 B. C., is the earliest known illustrated work.

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Trieste Strike Ends; Allies Probe Dispute

TRIESTE — (AP) — A general strike which had halted work through the British-American zone of disputed Venezia Giulia province was called off today as a four-power allied commission continued its on-the-spot investigation of conflicting Italian and Yugoslav border claims.

The strike had kept the city in a state of high tension, which was increased by a surprise demonstration yesterday when nearly 100,000 persons paraded past the commission's headquarters.

The Italo-Slovene Anti-Fascist Union, sponsor of the strike, said the strike was "suspended" as a sign of willingness to collaborate with allied authorities although military government officials had turned down a request to disband the civil police.

The strike was called two days ago as a protest against the killing of two persons by police who were removing a Slovene flag from a church in a suburb of Trieste.

The union, which is pro-Yugoslav, said it had unsuccessfully requested that patrols by black-uniformed, white-helmeted police be discontinued and that detectives in civilian clothes be disarmed.

The union charges that the police are composed mainly of Italians, that a large number were carabinieri and guards under the Fascist regime and that some recently were imported from other parts of Italy.

Antonio Umkar, a member of the union's executive committee, charged that 50,000 Italians had been brought in from other parts of Italy since December "for the purpose of impressing the commission."

UO Sees Micro-motion Pictures of Cell Growth

Micro-motion pictures of the growth and activities of cells in the bodies of living animals were shown on the campus Monday evening by Dr. C. C. Speidel, professor of anatomy at the University of Oregon chapter of Sigma Xi, national scientific research honorary.

The action of the cells under various conditions as shown in the pictures was speeded up, telescoping an hour or two of life into a minute of pictures, so that the usually slow course of events in cellular changes could be easily perceived.

Dr. Speidel has been doing special work with micro-motion pictures since 1932 and now has a library of 10,000 feet of film on biological subjects.

Defense Testifies In Oyster Bed Case

PORTLAND — (AP) — Two Salem men charged in 11 federal indictments with using mail to defraud investors in Coos Bay oyster bed sales testified in their own defense in court yesterday.

Edgar Robert Errion told the court under cross-examination that a purchase of seed reported at \$1.50 a string was a personal contract he made and not a transaction of the Coos Bay Farmers cooperative which managed the oyster enterprises from August, 1942, until the 1944 harvest. He admitted the actual cost of the 20,000 strings were \$1 each.

Glenn R. Munkers testified that buyers of the tidewater areas would go to Coos Bay and look at the operation then "come in and take them away from us." He said no "sales talks" had been necessary to sell the beds.

ONTARIO — (AP) — Installation of an Elks Club here March 30 will be planned at a meeting soon. Preliminary plans for the installation call for the presence of state lodge officers and the Boise Elks band.

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Northwest Christian Chapel Gets New Organ
