

### Goods Men Show OPA Exhibit

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Price Paul Porter agreed today to give an exhibit purporting to show inequalities in OPA policies but added that it was more accurate than most.

Porter said, however, that if the exhibit does disclose mistakes in pricing operations, "we will do everything we reasonably can to correct them."

The exhibit was set up in the Office Building by the National Retail Dry Goods Assn. It cited it as proof that OPA higher prices on new line merchandise than on quality produced by old-line manufacturers.

The association said these policies were discouraging established manufacturers from going into full production and at the same time contributing to inflation by forcing them to buy higher-priced raw goods.

OPA is opposing administrative plans to extend price controls another year until June 30, and displayed a similar case several months ago. Former Administrator Chester E. Branded it a "phony."

### Churchill Visits FDR Monument

HYDE PARK — (AP) — Winston Churchill took the familiar route up the Hudson River Valley Tuesday to the Roosevelt estate, the route he traveled so often during the war for conferences with the late Franklin D. Roosevelt.

This time Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt met him. He handed his Homburg and his cane to Mrs. Churchill and stepped through the hedge into the rose garden where the other half of one of history's greatest team of war leaders is buried.

For more than two minutes he contemplated the simple white marble grave stone, head slightly bowed, his face so expressionless it could have been a marble too. Then, gravely, he placed a wreath of rhododendron leaves and gardenias upon the grave of the friend whom he has survived.

In addition to Mrs. Roosevelt, he renewed another war-time friendship here. Fala, the President's scottie, came trotting up, tall wagging in salute and Churchill bent over and scratched his ears.

It was the first time Churchill had seen the monument which Franklin Roosevelt himself designed.

### Nye Seeks Dakota Senatorial Post

BISMARCK, N. D. — (AP) — Gerald P. Nye, leading pre-war non-interventionist, made a bid today to regain his old seat in the Senate.

Nye's campaigners sought support of delegates to the official Republican state convention, here to select a candidate for the short-term post created by the death of Sen. John Moses, who defeated him in the 1944 elections.

Endorsement by the official Republican convention would put Nye's name on the ballot as the Republican candidate, instead of that of Milton R. Young, candidate of the rival Republican Organizing Committee.

The ROC, which sponsored Nye in the 1944 contest, concluded a two-day convention yesterday, endorsing Young for the post he currently holds by gubernatorial appointment. State Sen. J. B. Bridston of Grand Forks was named for the long-term Senate seat now held by Sen. William Langer.

### Gripsholm Transports Commercial Passengers

ENGLAND — (AP) — The Swedish-American liner Gripsholm sailed for New York today with her first load of commercial passengers since the start of the war.

Chartered by the United States Government and operated by the American Export Lines, the ship is making the voyage to expedite the return of American citizens who have been in Europe during the war and who have no priority for travel.

Among the passengers were Robert B. Hurd, Eagle Point, Ore., and his London bride, the former Hilary Bormley-Derry.

### Angell Asks Surplus Depot for Portland

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Rep. Angell (R-Ore) today urged the War Assets Corp. to give more consideration to veterans desiring to purchase surplus government property for their own use.

Angell said he had received many complaints from veterans who say they are unable to get surplus government property when placed on sale. He said lack of a disposal station in Portland kept many veterans from making purchases and he urged the corporation to establish such a depot in that city and to eliminate red tape.

### Men Outnumber Coeds

SALEM — (AP) — Male enrollment at Willamette University exceeds enrollment of women for the first time since 1941, the university announced today. There were 319 men and 315 women enrolled for the spring semester today. The enrollment, which will be completed this week, probably will total 750, highest since 1942.
