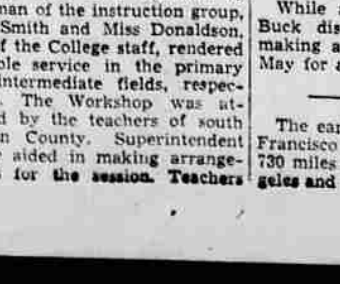
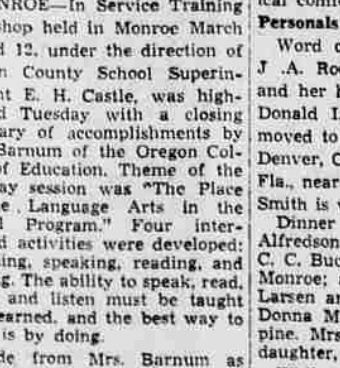
March 7, Rufus hummingbirds were seen, and are now seen every day, only males being seen now. Arrival of both swallows and hummingbirds is later than usual.

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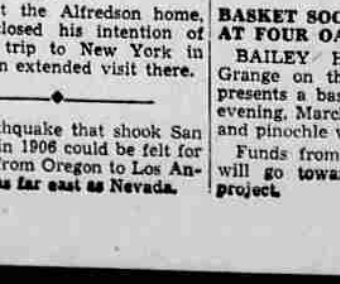
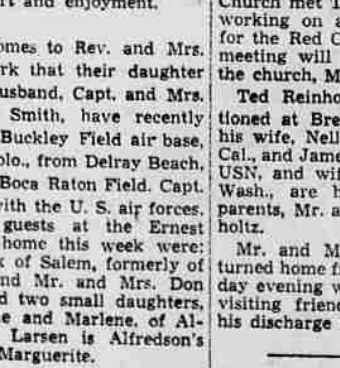
Teachers' Meet at Monroe Interesting
