

Coast-to-Coast SP Pullmans Planned

Southern Pacific, on June 2, will establish coast-to-coast through Pullman sleeping car service through Chicago, Claude E. Peterson, vice president, system passenger traffic, for the company announced Tuesday.

The Pullmans will be operated on the Golden State Limited from Los Angeles in connection with the Rock Island, and from San Francisco, in connection with Union Pacific and the Chicago North-western, and with trains of eastern lines between Chicago and New York.

The schedules of the Overland and the Golden State Limited, operating without extra fare, will be cut to approximately 48 hours on June 2, which will make it possible to provide a through coast-to-coast Pullman service on a

Planning Objectives Outlined to Officials

Eugene councilmen and school board members Tuesday were better acquainted with the paper work of the Central Lane County Planning Council after a Monday night session with Howard W. Buford, director.

At the two-and-a-half hour meeting in the City Hall the officials were familiarized, especially, with three separate city maps, upon which student distribution is registered for the 1946-47 school census. Purpose of the large layouts is to make possible a more intelligent building expansion, Buford said. The large maps provide information on grade, junior high and high school students population.

Buford also showed the conference map information on traffic accident density in various parts of the city and county. Most dangerous spots, the prepared map shows, include the downtown area and the Pacific Highway, especially at intersections in Glenwood and north of Eugene. The study will provide the means, planners hope, for improved future routing of the traffic flow through Eugene.

Buford also exhibited a land use map which shows in various colors the zoning of the city. It would seem, he said, that Eugene has too much land set aside for multiple residences. Light industry is also overzoned, Buford feels, or the proper areas are not now marked off for that purpose.

Committee Named To Study GIs Role

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—Secretary of War Patterson moved for an inquiry today into the Army's treatment of GIs as compared with officers, on which much criticism has been heard.

He appointed a civilian board of six former servicemen whose ranks ranged from general to sergeant to hold hearings and recommended any changes necessary for "building a citizen's army."

Heading the board is James H. Doolittle, former lieutenant general who led the Eighth Air Force.

Troy H. Middleton, who commanded the 45th division in north Africa and Sicily as a lieutenant general; Robert Neville, New York newspaperman who was officer-in-charge of the Mediterranean edition of the Stars and Stripes as a lieutenant colonel; Adna H. Underhill of Freeville, N. Y., former paratroop captain; Jake W. Lindsey, former technical sergeant and the 100th infantryman to win the Congressional Medal of Honor; and Mervyn M. Frost of Hanover, N. H., who was seriously wounded at Bari, Italy, as a sergeant with the 451st Bomb Group, are the other members of the board.

China Factions Battle Again

responsible for protecting Chinese government officials only in areas garrisoned by the Russians. The Chinese commander had requested protection for those assigned to administer Manchuria.

The Daily News said the Communists penetrated into Zepinghai after "ferocious attacks" against the small government garrison there. It charged the weak government position was due to Russian withdrawal Saturday without notice.

Speculation (Associated Press Correspondent Olen W. Clements radioed from Tientsin that Marines there expected their planes would be utilized to fly more Chinese government troops to Manchuria soon. There was no official announcement. Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer, U. S. commander in China, was expected in Tientsin today.

(Clements also said delayed dispatches to the newspaper Ta Kung Pao reported that Chinese Communists are besieging Changtsoo, Tieling and Kaiyuan as well as Szepeinghai.)

Another semi-official report said government-appointed Governor Liu of the Manchurian province of Liaopoh and other provincial officials had escaped from Szepeinghai, and that their whereabouts was unknown.

The Changchun dispatch said Malinovsky's chief of staff told Gen. Tung Yen-Ping, ranking Chinese officer in Changchun, that no Soviet forces were in areas south of Changchun except a "handful purchasing food."

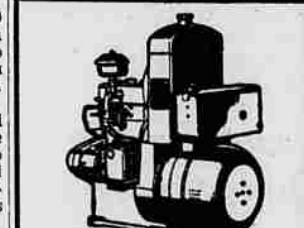
