Dairy Herd Group Elects New Officers

New officers were elected by the Lane County Dairy Herd Improvement Association at their annual meeting in the 4H Club Building at the county fairgrounds Thursday. The meeting was a re-organization meeting, and was the first annual meeting of the association since it disbanded in 1942.

W. C. Waite, of Cushman, was elected president of the association. V. H. Davis, Route 2, Eugene, was elected vice-president.

Secretary treasurer of the association for the coming year will be Archie Reed, Route 5, Eugene. David Huntington, Florence, and Elmer Grimes, Route 5, Eugene, were elected to serve with these officers in comprising the board of directors for the association.

Milk Tester Hired
 Clifford E. Pierson was hired as milk tester for the association after County Agent O. S. Fletcher announced a sufficient number of dairymen in Lane County had signed up to guarantee a tester 25 days work a month. Twenty-three dairymen have signed up, Fletcher said, and 872 dairy cows in Lane County will come under the association's testing program.

Pierson was introduced at the meeting by H. P. Ewalt, assistant extension dairyman at Oregon State College. A newcomer to the Pacific Coast, Pierson was formerly a milk tester for a dairy association in Scott County, Minnesota, which position he had held for the past 20 years. Present plans are to start testing on April 1.

The association voted at the meeting to admit to membership in the association all of the applicants who had signed up in the 1946 program.

Civic Leaders Hear of Army's Need for Men

Carrying a plea to the citizens of this community to help provide the country with one million men for the regular peacetime army, Col. William G. Griffin, executive officer of Camp Beale, Calif., Thursday night explained the need for voluntary enlistments in the regular army.

At a dinner with representative civic leaders at the Eugene Hotel, Col. Griffin compared the regular army of 20 years ago with that of today and with the army we will need in the years ahead.

From 1922 to 1935, he stated, the regular army stood at 14,000 officers and 125,000 enlisted men. That army could have been seated in New York's Stadium, with room to spare.

From 1935 to 1940, the size of the army jumped to 165,000 enlisted men, but the number of officers remained the same.

"In my opinion, what happened at Pearl Harbor was evidence that our army was entirely inadequate. Its inadequacy was proven by the fact that we were unable to take the offensive until a year after Pearl Harbor was bombed."

"At Camp Beale alone we have separated one quarter million men from the army. But voluntary enlistments have not been at a corresponding rate," the colonel said.

Congress has authorized a regular army of 1,600,000 men.

The type of men wanted in the regular army now are:

1 The men of the wartime army;
 2 Men who became skilled in civilian occupations during the war;

3 Young men with no previous training, but with high school educations.

"Before the war, the regular army man did not have the respect of the country. Actually, the people knew little about the army," stated Col. Griffin.

"Some people looked down on the so-called common army man—they believed he was the type of man who could not make a decent living as a civilian."

Col. Griffin pointed out that men of the army now are receiving the highest salaries in its history. They may retire with lifetime pensions at the end of either 20 or 30 years. The pay of a private in the regular army is equivalent to \$40 a week in civilian life, with food, lodging and clothing provided.

The dinner to enlist the aid of some 25 civic leaders was called by Lt. Col. William M. Cohoon of the Military Procurement Service at Portland, who presided.

DeMoss has had wide experience as a band master, having directed bands at several cities in Pennsylvania before moving to Eugene 18 years ago. He pointed out that Eugene is in need of a band for civic events, as there is at present no regular band to serve this purpose.

Services Announced For Dan McLaughlan
 PORTLAND — (P) — Funeral services for Dan M. McLaughlan, 92, Albina mayor when that community was incorporated into Portland 54 years ago, were planned here today.

McLaughlan retired 22 years ago after being master mechanic in the Southern Pacific Railroad's Brooklyn shops here, and 1500 fellow employees pitched in \$2 each to buy him an auto. From 1892-96 he was Portland police commissioner, and from 1898-1903 head of the police department. He died yesterday.

A daughter and two sons, including Arthur McLaughlan of Salem, survive.

Army Menus Reduced To Conform With Plan
 WASHINGTON — (P) — In line with President Truman's food conservation plan to help feed a hungry world, the Army is tightening its belt.

The Quartermaster Corps has revised its master menus to cut by six and one half pounds for each vegetable the amounts of canned asparagus, beans, spinach and tomatoes served to 100 men.

Meat cooks in preparing meals for 100 men also will fix only 10 pounds of beef instead of 15; 20 pounds of cabbage instead of 25 and 65 pounds of potatoes instead of 75.

Bread has been cut from 15 pounds to 13 for each 100 men at each meal. There are also smaller portions of breakfast foods.

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MELLOW WHEAT
