Registration dates and date of the first class in the Eugene Home Planners Institute sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce will be announced in the near future. Plans for the project were furthered Thursday night at a meeting of the Institute Board of Directors in the Eugene Hotel.

Robert Booth, vice-chairman of the board and chairman of the program committee, reported on tentative plans. Institute speakers will discuss such subjects as selecting the homestead, planning the house, construction, materials, land securing, acquiring title to land, costs and financing, concrete, plumbing, electricity, exterior finish, windows, doors and glass, flooring, interior finish, heating, kitchen arrangement and interior decoration and furnishing.

Loy Rowling, finance committee chairman, reported for his group and two new members of the board were announced by H. F. McDaniel, institute chairman. They are Ray Boals, Water Board superintendent, and Tracy Stocker, electrical dealer.

Circuit Court Case
Ends as Non-Suit

Judge and jury men of the Lane County Circuit Court finished another week of work at mid-morning Friday when the damages case of Elmer Smith vs. David Williams ended in a non-suit.

The plaintiff had sought \$10,000 as the result of an automobile accident in Lane County.

Earlier jury men delivered a verdict in favor of Gordon G. Poff who filed for damages against E. Williams. Poff was awarded \$286 special damages and \$1292 general damages. The plaintiff in his suit sought \$276 special damages and \$2500 general damages as the result of an automobile accident on the Willamette Highway.

Black Market Raid Causes Riot
 STUTTGART, Germany.—(AP)—One displaced Jew was killed, five were wounded, and an American soldier and several German policemen were injured Friday in violent rioting which followed a black market raid on a displaced persons camp in Stuttgart's outskirts.

Two hours of rioting erupted when German police, accompanied by a "token force" of U. S. military police, moved into the camp to search for counterfeit ration stamps. First reports indicated the fighting was complicated when nearby American soldiers, who did not know the raid had official sanction, rushed to the aid of the displaced persons.

The riot ended only when American armored cars rolled into the camp.

About 135 German police, accompanied by U. S. military police and 85 German investigators, moved into the camp at 6:30 a.m.

Cordon Tells Needs For McNary Dam
 WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Senator Guy Cordon (R-Ore.) said Friday that the superionic research center, which he announced yesterday may be established in the Pacific Northwest, would require all Grand Coulee's present surplus electric energy and all the additional power it could generate.

The center would include huge wind tunnels for testing airplane flight in the stratosphere; would use around one million horsepower of electric energy he said, and would cost half a billion dollars.

He said this project and a foreseeable demand for industrial power in the Pacific Northwest made the speedy construction of the McNary Dam on the Columbia "absolutely necessary."

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
