Reedsport Launches The "Aloma"

REEDSPORT — The "Aloma," new 60-foot drag-boat recently completed at the Fred Schulte boat yard in Gardiner was launched Sunday morning at 5 a.m. Mrs. Virgil Strong, wife of the owner, acting as sponsor. Built for Virgil Strong of Eureka, Cal., the boat, which has a 17-foot beam and carries of 38-foot mast, has been completely outfitted at Gardiner. Hon-duras mahogany has been used for cabin trim, doors and sashes and the craft will be powered by a 250 horse-power Cummings heavy duty diesel engine. Special equipment features include an automatic pilot, radio, telephone, tachometer and direction finder.

Salem Milk Delivery Halted by Strike

SALEM, March 30 — All milk deliveries in Salem ended Saturday morning as the last dairy to attempt deliveries ceased operations because of the lack of milk from independent producers.

Hans Hofstetter, dairy owner who declared Friday his intention of filing suit against the Dairy Cooperative Association for violation of the anti-trust act, refused to comment Saturday on any further developments of his proposed case.

Hofstetter attempted to resume deliveries to regular customers Friday but was forced to compromise on a 25 per cent basis and Saturday declared it impossible to make any deliveries in Salem in view of his supply from independent producers. Deliveries will be continued on a limited basis in West Salem.

4-H Poster Contest Rules Announced
County Club Agent E. A. Dan-jelson has announced rules for the 1946 4-H Club poster contest. The contest is open to any 4-H boy or girl and each club may enter one poster, all of which must be 14 by 22 inches in size. Five places will be awarded prizes of ribbons and cash.

Government to Increase Europe Grain Shipments

The Agriculture Department, effective Monday, put new restrictions on the purchase and use of grain feeds and ordered a 15 to 20 per cent cut in the use of corn for manufactured foods. The order affects grits, cornmeal and breakfast cereals but not canned corn.
