JOBLESS INCREASE

PORTLAND, Ore., March 30.—(AP)—Unemployment in Oregon increased 7 per cent in March, putting the total at 70,876, Lee C. Stoll, state director of the U. S. Employment Service, reported today. Unemployment among veterans increased 2315 in March over February and 22,115 jobless veterans now are listed, he said. The number of unemployed women increased from 15,900 to 17,514.

Wage Board Okays Lumber Pay Boost

WASHINGTON, March 30.—(AP)—The National Wage Stabilization Board announced today that it would approve a new wage increase ceiling for approximately 125,000 workers in the West Coast lumber industry.

The increases are for pricing purposes and authorize 15 cents an hour above rates in effect on Aug. 17, 1945.

The board estimated that 2500 firms were involved. It said that a majority of lumber concerns in Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho and Montana already had established a 15-cent increase pattern between Aug. 17, 1945, and Feb. 14, 1946.

The action today gives advance board approval for increases up to the ceiling and requires OPA to consider the increase as a factor in costs.
