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Supt. Putnam Tells Shortage Of Teachers

SALEM—(AP)—Education in Oregon is being greatly hampered by a serious lack of qualified teachers, but this is one shortage that can't be blamed entirely upon the war, Superintendent of Public Instruction Rex Putnam said today.

Black Picture

"These figures paint a black picture for the future of Oregon education," Putnam predicted. "Very few of the 350 or 400 who went off to war are returning to the teaching profession, leaving only teachers now employed plus a few new ones each year to carry the task of educating our youngsters."

Putnam Believes the Primary Cause for this Shortage is a Matter of Salaries

By an act of legislature the minimum teaching wage was set at \$1200 a year for nine months work. This is a considerable increase over the 1931 salary of \$75 or the 1939 minimum of \$85, but under existing conditions, the present \$133.33 monthly minimum apparently is still too low to attract new blood into the teaching ranks of the state's elementary and high schools.

Costs \$2400

It costs a person approximately \$2400 to attend four years of teachers' college, although some have gone through on \$500 a year, Putnam said.

Week-End Crashes Cause One Death

SALEM—(AP)—One person was killed and five others were injured, one critically, in two automobile accidents near here over the week end.

Charles Risten, 20, Stayton, died in a Salem hospital late Saturday as a result of injuries received when his car went out of control and rolled over several times on the Salem-Stayton highway, state police said.

Harold W. Perton, Woodburn, today was still in critical condition in a hospital here with injuries suffered in a two-car head-on collision 14 miles north of Salem on the Pacific Highway.

Freeman B. Waterman, who was with Perton, suffered concussion and face and arm lacerations but was reported in "fair" condition today.

Mrs. George Dieringer, Monmouth, a passenger in a car driven by her husband, Alexander, suffered a leg fracture in the head-on crash and the Dieringers' son, Jack, was being treated for a broken pelvis. The husband was dismissed after treatment for possible fractured ribs.

4-H Forestry Camp Meetings Postponed

The overnight trip to Fall Creek 4-H Club Camp for forestry and camp cookery club boys has been postponed from April 13 and 14 to April 20 and 21.

The program will include instruction by Dan Robinson, extension forester, and Verne McDaniels, nurseryman at the Oregon State nursery.

County Club Agent E. A. Danielson has suggested each boy take food necessary for all meals. The food will be prepared, weather permitting, over open fires.

Generally speaking the state grade and high school teaching staffs are 15 per cent short of needs and 25 per cent short of qualified instructors, Putnam said. He bases his estimates on the teacher-student ratio.

Many observe the situation with the idea that because schools are open and operating, everything is satisfactory, Putnam said.

"But," he added interrogatively, "when all our old duffers die, who is going to take our places? I'd say the picture looks very dark indeed."

Drain Twins Stick It Out Until They Get Army Discharges

FORT LEWIS, Wash., April 1.—(AP)—Getting an Army discharge is a tough proposition at best, but the obstacles thrown into the path of the Letsoms twins of Drain, Ore., were enough to make lesser men throw up their hands in defeat.

Sergeants Richard and Ronald Letsom, who have served together in the Army Air Forces since July, 1943, took off from Langley Field for Fort Lewis and discharge. Ten minutes after the take-off, their plane was forced down by bad weather at Lynchburg, Va.

The determined brother sergeants got as far as Omaha, Neb., before the plane was forced down again when the propeller nearly flew off. It was an ice-covered carburetor that grounded the aircraft near Sidney, Neb., and weather again at Rock Springs, Wyo. Snow eased the plane to the ground at Cokeville, Wyo.

Finally the Letsoms soured on air travel and finished the trip by train.

Sporting discharge papers, the brothers were home today, three days behind schedule.
