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60 Bodies Recovered
Robert Lindsey, chairman of Red Cross disaster relief here said 60 bodies had been recovered from wreckage in Hilo and "I expect there will be more."

Territorial Gov. Ingram Stainback invoked the Hawaiian Defense Act "for the safeguarding of life and property and the preservation of law and order" in wave-ravaged areas.

Casualty reports appeared to be complete from all damaged areas except the island of Hawaii, on which Hilo with its 25,000 population is located.

Rescue by Air
A score of persons previously reported missing had been saved from the waters off Hawaii by Army and Navy air-sea rescue

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disaster-relief jobs in Hawaiian history.

The Army opened a recreation camp to 3000 homeless, and a fleet of transport and bomber planes was shuttling medicines and foods to hard-hit Hilo.

Pearl Harbor Undamaged
Honolulu's leeward location sheltered the luxury hotels of Waikiki Beach and left naval shipping in landlocked Pearl Harbor undamaged.

Hilo, exposed to the full force of the waves, was a scene of horror. Weeping friends and relatives waited on high ground as troops in the wrecked waterfront recovered bodies.

Buildings were crushed and ripped apart, huge gaps were pushed through concrete walls, and there was a sprawling litter of what had been railroad cars, automobiles, trucks, buildings and boats.

Army patrols guarded against looting, although martial law had not been declared.

program also would enable farmers with high 1946 incomes to hold down their income taxes by keeping their certificates until next year. They eventually would have to pay taxes on the money, however.

Anderson assured Florento LaGuardia, newly elected director of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, that this country will come within "a few thousand tons" of meeting its wheat export pledges of 3,000,000 tons for this quarter.

He said meat exports for the same period would total nearly 430,000,000 pounds, or 70,000,000 pounds short of its commitments.

By June, Anderson said, U. S. shipments overseas should reach 1,000,000,000 pounds, which would meet our full quota.

Meanwhile, the United Nations food and agriculture organization took its first concrete action to meet the world food crisis by calling all international food groups and food ministers to a meeting here next May 20.

The conference, scheduled to last a week, will deal with long-range planning rather than immediate famine conditions.

Safety Council Elects Erickson

Arthur G. Erickson was new chairman of the Eugene Safety Council Tuesday following a Monday evening election following the resignation of Cliff Culp.

Following recommendations made by the council, the police department agreed to removing one additional parking meter space to downtown bus zones. Bus zones 100 feet in length will be provided on the south sides of Eleventh and Thirteenth Aves. E. and vehicles making left turns at those intersections will stop there instead of on Willamette. Deliveries and pick ups by trucks on Willamette St. will be prohibited between the hours of 4 and 6 p.m.

some such veterans of GOP political battles as Werner Schroeder of Illinois, Reece won on the third ballot in a torrid committee session.

The 56-year-old Tennesseean, a veteran of nearly 25 years of congressional service, told delegates at a victory dinner last night he realizes the national chairman "cannot make the Republican Party or determine its destinies."

That was the same point made by Stassen, who said he did not believe Reece's selection "constitutes a declaration by the Republican Party as to its policy or platform."

Stassen said significantly he was prepared to cooperate with Reece in this year's congressional elections. He did not go further than that.

In his victory talk to the confident party members, Reece asserted that a "New Deal monopoly" has been in charge with resulting "secret" and "bureaucratic" government.

"As Republicans, we want labor and agriculture and the people generally to have their full rights," the new chairman said. "But we have got to restore in this nation the doctrine that first of all wage earners and farmers and city folk are all Americans—they all are consumers, they all are citizens under the constitution."

"It is still not possible to continue this nation free and prosperous and still put class against class, race against race, section against section."

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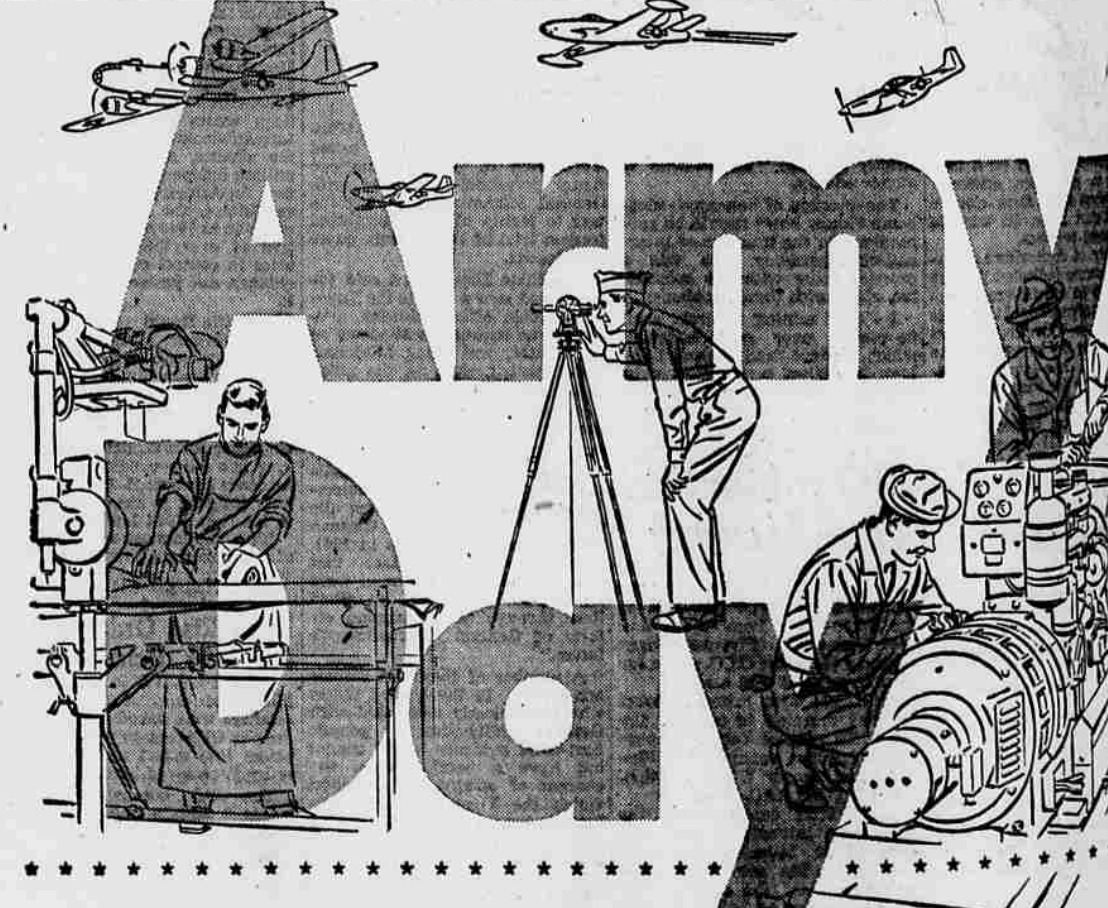
