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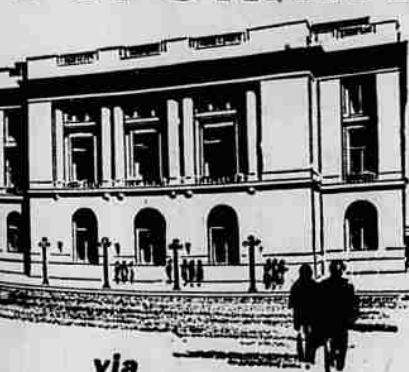
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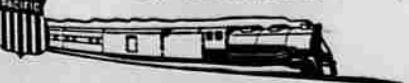

Speaker Describes
Malaysia People
In Tuesday Talk

Presenting a travelogue descrip-
tion of the Malaysian area, Dr.
Fay-Cooper Cole, outstanding
American anthropologist, Tuesday
evening sketched for his audience
on the University of Oregon cam-
pus the peoples and culture of this
island world that lies "at the
Orient" and bids to be one of
the most important areas in the
postwar world.

Dr. Cole, appearing on the Con-
don lectureship series, presented
the first of two lectures on Malay-
sia. In this discussion of peoples,
land, and culture, and the influ-
ences of religion, politics, influx
of races, climate and environ-
ment he gave a background for
the political and economic impor-
tance of the area, which he will
discuss in Thursday evening's lec-
ture.

The Malaysian area, as describ-
ed by Dr. Cole, extends down the
Malay peninsula through Java,
Sumatra, the Celebes, Borneo and
up through the Philippines. It
ranges from a densely populated
area in Java, which represents the
most densely populated area in the
world, to the larger island of
Borneo, where population is more
limited.

Garden Spot
The rim islands of the area
constitute the greatest volcanic
chain in the world, but strangely,
lava rock has not built up the
land. Rather it has been formed
of extremely fertile volcanic ash
that makes this area, in part, a
garden spot of the world.

The shallow seas that surround
the area and the recurrence of
flora types in the several islands
and districts, indicate that it was
once connected by land bridges.
Also, indications are that man has
been long in this part of the
world. Dr. Cole described the peo-
ples of the area, from the pigmy
Negro population, through the
proto-Malaysians, with their char-
acteristics indicating connections
with the Caucasians, and the
southern Mongoloids, closely re-
lated to the Chinese. This latter
group seems to constitute the true
Malayian, he said.

Catholicism of the Spaniards,
Mohammadism—all outside relig-
ions have made felt their in-
fluence, but still the Malayian,
underneath, makes naught of time
and climate, by his ancient trust
in magic, Dr. Cole related.

Colored slides were used to il-
lustrate the discussion.

The Condon lectureship, estab-
lished by the Oregon State Board
of Higher Education, for the pur-
pose of making known to the pub-
lic the results of scientific re-
search, was activated for the first
time this year. Dr. Cole's lectures
are the second series of the group.
His lecture on Malaysia in the
Postwar World will be given in
207 Chapman Hall Thursday, April
4, at 8 p. m. The public is invited.

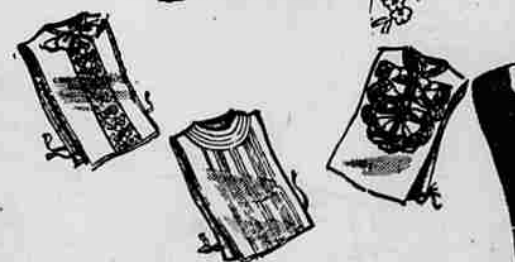
