

Eugene Students Win Top Ratings at Salem

Eighteen Eugene music students and groups garnered top ratings in the Willamette Valley District Music Contest held Friday in Salem High School. Twelve of the groups and soloists won No. 1 classification.

Eugene High School's cappella choir, girls' sextet, and double mixed quartet were awarded the top spots for vocal groups. The Girls' Glee Club and the Boys' Glee Club followed with ratings of Nos. 2 and 3.

No. 1 spots went to vocal soloists Dick Mack, tenor, Edgar De-Cou, baritone, and Derald Parks, bass. Soprano Marilyn Johns and Shirley Anderson, mezzo-soprano, were given No. 2 ratings by the judges.

Vocalists were instructed and directed by Mrs. Thelma Landes and Glenn Griffith of Eugene High School.

Mary Jo Summers took a No. 1 spot with a cornet solo to complete the Friday high school division.

In the junior high school instrumental division Friday, five high ratings went to the following students: Mary Lou Watts, violin, Woodrow Wilson; Shirley Ann Guay and Donna Marie Guay, violin double concerto, Colin Kelly; Jane Van Rysselberghe, cello, Roosevelt, and Maxine Banton, viola. Soloists taking No. 2 ratings in the division were: Maxine Nuttman, violin, Wilson, and Shirley Guay, violin, Colin Kelly.

Following the Mozart Concerto, the violinist will play the Sonata A Major Opus 100, by Brahms.

Kreisler's "Slavonic Dance in G-Minor, Suk's "Chant d'amour" and "Scherzo-Tarantelle" by Wieniawski will complete the third and final group of program.

Accompanying Mrs. Allton will be Sage Collin-Boughton, instructor in music in the university.

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Boeing Engineers Testing New Materials for Space Flights

SEATTLE—(U.S.)—Anticipating now under way to sample heat and shock resistant qualities of earth's atmosphere, structural engineers of the Boeing Aircraft Co. are testing newly-developed structural materials capable of withstanding tremendous heat and shock, officials said.

Forecasting development of aerial speeds touching 2700 miles an hour, possibly within 10 years, Company Vice-President Wellwood E. Beall, said tests were

now under way to sample heat and shock resistant qualities of thin, laminated metallic sheets of lightweight alloy filled with various medium density materials.

"Our engineers are trying to cope with problems of friction-induced heat and strength to withstand possible collision with cosmic flossam and jetsam," Beall said.

The official top company engineer, said that Boeing techni-

cians were experimenting with use of balsa wood, foamed hard rubber, foamed aluminum, glass fibre, plywood, cork and plastics, as fillers for the laminated alloy structural sheets, or "sandwiches."

"Problems raised by accelerations and deceleration of great magnitude, and insulation against rays now filtered out by the earth's atmosphere also must be tackled in the next 10 years," he said.

Beall hinted at future use of light alloys other than aluminum or magnesium in later experiments.

"As an index, it should be ap-

parent that if the melting point of the light metals—aluminum and magnesium—is in the vicinity of 1200 degrees Fahrenheit, and such temperatures are encountered at speeds for approximately 2600 to 2700 miles an hour, these metals as they now exist will not be used."

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Classes in Nursing Slated on Campus

Red Cross Home Nursing classes will be taught on the campus this term for all wives of student veterans, according to Mrs. Glen Harnden, Red Cross Home Nursing chairman.

Mrs. Harnden, who has been head of home nursing work for the Red Cross for more than four years, has organized classes in high schools throughout the county, and is now extending the work to the university.

Three classes, with an expected enrollment of 60 veterans' wives, will start Tuesday in the Fairmount Church of Christ near the campus. Mrs. Annette Aylworth, graduate nurse who has taught the classes in the county high schools, and First Lt. Florence H. Jackson, Army nurse recently returned from Calcutta, India, will teach the campus classes. Two afternoon classes and one evening class are scheduled.

Mrs. Harnden has estimated that more than 500 women have been trained in home nursing by the Red Cross in Lane County since she has headed the committee.

4-H Club 8th Graders Tour City's Big Firms
