UO Students to Aid French Orphans

Students of elementary French at the University of Oregon, including many veterans who were in France during the war, will ask local merchants to contribute food and clothing for French orphans.

During winter term, the students organized the French Club for the purpose of studying that nation's culture. Many student veterans who had seen France and knew of existing conditions, felt that something should be done to aid the country's children. During spring vacation members of the club sent packages to Centre Scolaire, the center for some 300 French orphans organized by the French government after the liberation.

"Best Way to Help"

Dr. Berthold C. Friedl, associate professor of Romance languages, declared the students' plan is unique.

"Already the students have made direct contact with the children, and news of their efforts to send relief has reached French publications."

"For anyone who wishes to help the people of France, this is the best way to do it," Dr. Friedl said. "Furthermore, it is necessary for international understanding."

Centre Scolaire was organized by the French government to re-educate thousands of orphans after the Nazi occupation. Most of the children lost their fathers during the resistance. Many are without both parents, said Dr. Friedl. The school center is located in the city of Gap in southeastern France, not far from the Italian border.

Robert Kyle of Florence, president of the French Club, said stores and theaters near the campus have been asked to donate funds for postage. Other merchants throughout the city will be asked to donate food and clothing, in addition to the packages to be sent by individual members of the club.

4,300 Men to Arrive On Four Ships Today

PIPER SAFETY TROPHY

All flyers of Piper Cub airplanes will have a chance to participate in a big Piper Safety Contest to begin April 1, it was announced today by Joe Harrel and Geo. Coffee of Eugene Flying Service, official sponsors of the contest in this area.

Primary purpose of the contest is to promote safety in flying in general and to increase interest in aviation on the part of the community.

Eligibility requirements and contest rules have purposely been kept simple to encourage the greatest number of applicants since in this way the most public benefit will be derived from the contest. All flyers of Piper Cubs are eligible for the Safety Contest, with the exception of paid flight instructors and employees of Eugene Flying Service. The contest will start April 1 and end September 30, 1946. During this flown by each contestant will be kept by the sponsor, and the winner will be determined by selecting the contestant who has flown the most number of hours in a Piper Cub, with the best safety record.

The winner will be awarded a distinctive trophy, which will bear his name, engraved on a bronze plate which is part of the trophy's base. This attractive award has an ivory-finished metal base on which stands a reproduction of a new Piper low wing in flight attitude. This trophy is the creation of one of America's foremost designers.

Eugene Flying Service urges prospective contestants to visit the Eugene Airpark now and get complete details of the Piper Safety Contest. Entry blanks are available there, which should be filled out and turned in promptly.

The winner of the Piper Safety Contest will be announced in this newspaper as soon as the decision of the official judges has been reached.

Special Payments Set on Seed Crops

Because of the critical shortage of alfalfa, red clover, and alsike seeds, special poundage payments will be offered to encourage increased harvesting of these seed crops in 1946. Ernest E. Schrenk, chairman of the county AAA committee, announced Saturday.

He advised county producers that payments will be computed on a clean seed basis on seed harvested and sold into commercial channels before Jan. 1, 1947. Rates of payment are 7 cents a pound on alfalfa and alsike clover seed and 9 cents a pound on red clover. These 1946 rates are considerably higher than the 2½ cent and 3½ cent rates for similar payments in 1945.

Oregon's 1946 production goals for these three seed crops call for 10,000 acres of alfalfa seed, an increase of 43 per cent; 20,000 acres of red clover seed, an increase of 54 per cent; and 30,000 acres of

alsike clover seed, an increase of 300 per cent.

In addition to the poundage payment, Mr. Schrenk said, acreage payments of \$3.50 an acre up to \$35 per farm are offered for harvesting red clover, alfalfa, and alsike seed.

He also reminded that producers who have not filed a 1946 farm plan will need to do so before May 1 if they intend to take part in the 1946 agricultural conservation program.
