## Army Probes 'Pox Outbreak

**WASHINGTON**—UP—The Army Surgeon General's office reported it is investigating outbreaks of smallpox on the Pacific Coast and tightening all military quarantine safeguards against importation of small pox and other diseases.

The Army medical officers are making their investigation jointly with the Navy and U. S. Public Health Service. An Army quarantine officer has been assigned to check on all quarantine of incoming personnel.

Six cases of smallpox among army men have reached the Pacific Coast aboard transports despite elaborate medical precautions. Army medical officers reported.

All but one of the smallpox cases were detected while the men were still aboard ship enroute to the states. One case involved a soldier who was flown from Japan and developed symptoms enroute.

The Surgeon General's Office said doctors were attempting to trace possible connection between returning servicemen and smallpox outbreaks in California and neighboring West Coast States.

"The connection between Army and civilian cases has not been traced with any degree of certainty," a spokesman for the Army Medical Department said.

The Army and the Public Health Service are confident that American vaccine is adequate to protect against malignant oriental smallpox if it is given properly.

Evasions and improper vaccinations were blamed for the new cases which have arrived back in America from overseas.

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## Traffic Accidents Take Upward Trend

Traffic accidents followed the upward trend of traffic volume during the last five months of 1945 says Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr.

During the last five months of the year total accidents were up 105 percent; fatalities increased 166 percent; and injuries were 245 percent greater than for the same period of 1944.

Fatalities in urban areas showed the heaviest increase following the end of the war. Fatalities for the state as a whole were up 166 percent during the last five months, while fatalities in urban areas went up 218 per cent.

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## Crow Man Explains Japanese War Map

How the Jap war lords planned, from initial attacks on Hawaii, to subdue the western hemisphere and bring it under the influence of the Far East is shown in a military map in the possession of F. A. Goodbrod, of Crow.

Goodbrod said the map was taken from a Japanese in eastern Oregon in 1941 and turned in to him, when he was commander of the Oregon National Guard Unit at Union.

Goodbrod states that it is similar to the one turned over to the FBI early in 1941 by Kilsoo K. Haan, Korean nationalist agent, who obtained the map from a Korean cabin-boy on a Pacific liner. The cabin-boy stole this map from a Japanese military intelligence agent traveling to this country as a tourist for the purpose of consolidating Japanese nationalist groups.

**Four-Phase Plan**  
The Japanese had a four-phase plan to bring North and Central America to their knees. The first action involved the attack on Pearl Harbor, invasion and capture of the Philippines, Guam, Wake and Midway. These attacks were initially successful, only the invasion of Midway Island failed. Secondly, the plan called for the occupation of the southwest Pacific, and the capture of Kiska in the Aleutians.

Invasion of western Alaska and increasingly heavy blows at the west coast of the United States comprised the third phase of the plan. In this Hawaii was to be bypassed.

**Occupation of Hawaii**  
Goodbrod explained that the fourth part of the plan included the occupation of Hawaii, invasion of Central America and capture of the Panama Canal. This was to be followed by invasion of the western states and occupation as far east as Yellowstone National Park in the north and Houston, Texas, in the south.

The Japs believed that the demoralizing influence of the western occupation and the losses suffered by the United States in these proposed attacks would force the American people to sue for peace, and be satisfied with a midwest and east coast United States.

But, Goodbrod pointed out, the Japanese map shows a fleet of capital battleships bombarding the eastern seaboard—as a final phase of the plan for subduing the United States.
