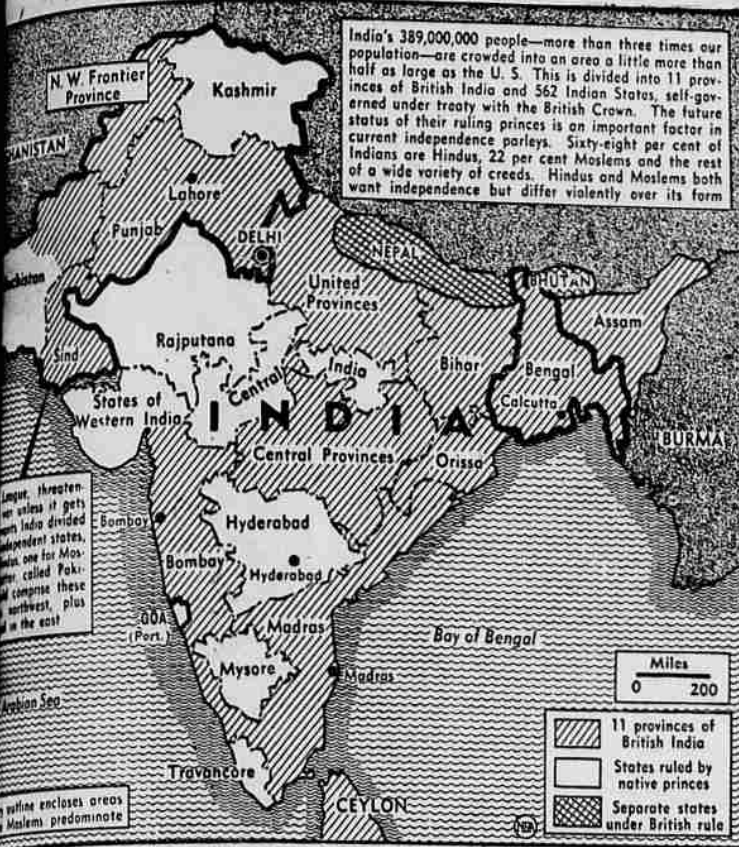




India's 389,000,000 people—more than three times our population—are crowded into an area a little more than half as large as the U. S. This is divided into 11 provinces of British India and 562 Indian States, self-governed under treaty with the British Crown. The future status of their ruling princes is an important factor in current independence parleys. Sixty-eight per cent of Indians are Hindus, 22 per cent Moslems and the rest of a wide variety of creeds. Hindus and Moslems both want independence but differ violently over its form.

Current concern with India—"diamond in the crown of Empire"—puts the world spotlight on a land beset with political turmoil, religious strife, famine and general poverty. Provinces of India under direct rule of British governors appointed by London and the states ruled internally by native princes. Of the 562 Indian states, only the more important are indicated.

The students, from western Oregon and southwestern Washington, will be on the campus for two days, May 3 and 4, taking part in special instrumental, vocal, orchestral and band competition.

Members of the Phi Beta alumnae group, assisted by Phi Beta patronesses and active members of the national professional music and drama honorary, will be in charge of housing and registration for the contest. Under the direction of Mrs. Edward Gray, president of the alumnae organization, householders in Eugene will be contacted in an effort to house the high school students in private homes.

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Pendleton Mill Man To Build for Vets

PENDLETON, April 6—(AP)—Promising to "build houses until Pendleton doesn't need any more," Clyde Harris of Harris Pine Mills and the building firm of Collier and Harris, today announced plans to build up to 150 residences in the \$2,500 to \$3,000 price bracket here.

Harris said that he will seek OPA priority for the building and will offer houses first to veterans. Buildings will be four-room frame dwellings on half-lot or slightly larger tracts. Ten of the new homes are now under construction, he said.

The Harris firm is also developing a new addition here where they plan to build about sixty homes at greater cost.
