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Lo Poor English Prof Whose Bedeviled Mind Sees Frash on Clouds

The number of students in be-
ginning English Composition
spring term at the University of
Oregon marks a 325 percent in-
crease over the enrollment for the
same period last year, according
to Randall V. Mills, instructor in
English in charge of registration.

Now enrolled in composition
classes are 1489 students, fifty-
four sections of about 28 pupils
each. Of these, 9 sections are be-
ginning offered in beginning compo-
sition. Only two were being of-

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ferred last year at this time. Com-
pared with four sections offered
last year to second-term compo-
sition, 14 are now scheduled,
marking a 208 percent increase
over last year's enrollment fig-
ures. Third-term students were
allowed 31 sections to accommo-
date the great number of stu-
dents who came in as freshman
fall term, compared with 28 sec-
tions offered last year.

The general over-all increase in
composition classes is approxi-
mately 84 percent with still high-
er figures anticipated for the next
school year.
