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Surplus War Goods Topic

The subject of how to acquire
surplus government property will
be attacked again next Tuesday
when representatives of the Port-
land regional office of the War
Assets Administration will appear
before members of the Chamber of
Commerce at a meeting in the
Eugene Hotel.

Speakers will explain in detail
the plans they have for making
such property available for pur-
chase. WAA now sells approxi-
mately 90 per cent of all surplus
property, principal exceptions be-
ing farm land, marine equipment
and foodstuffs.

An announcement from the
Portland office, which handles
surplus disposal in Oregon and
southwestern Washington, said its
aim is to personalize its service
as much as possible and that "The
result of consumer goods being
transferred from the Seattle office
to the Portland office has greatly
increased the benefit the latter
can be to the state. Almost daily
it is putting up new lists of sur-
plus for sale. Machinery, raw ma-
terials and finished products flow
through the Portland inventory
and as the Army and Navy move
more toward a peacetime basis,
these stocks increase."
