Increase in textile prices will be
around 20 per cent.

Most foods will return to the
June 30 ceilings except those
which continue to be decontrolled
—milk, grains, poultry and eggs.
The agency expects to act im-
mediately to reflect higher grain
prices in higher ceilings on bread,
cereals and other items made from
grain. A number of minor food
items are expected to be decon-
trolled.

Meanwhile, OPA will have to
readjust its restaurant prices to
allow for the decontrolled items
from which food is made. Many
items are expected to go up 5
cents, and meat cuts probably will
go much higher. The new legisla-
tion permits restaurants to realize
their customary profit rather than
the profit given them by OPA be-
fore June 30.

Most industries can come in for
some kind of an increase under
the bill. OPA plans to grant in-
creases on such items as farm
machinery (above 5 per cent),
hardware items (10 to 50 per
cent), newsprint, and pig iron.

OPA does not plan to "bail out"
businesses that bought many
items in the past three weeks well
above the old ceilings are required
to sell under price control because
of the revival of OPA. Undoubt-
edly many will lose money. But as
one spokesman for OPA put it—
"Price Administrator Paul Porter
told all buyers on July 1 that they
were buying at their own risk."
