

Grove To See Indian Pageant

COTTAGE GROVE—R. S. Drenner, Culp Creek resident, has written a pageant of the Indian lore and will present it August 17 and 18 at the M. A. Horn ranch home just north of town, under the sponsorship of the Rod and Gun Club here. Proceeds of the pageant will go to a special state conservation program.

The Indian pageant, "Passage of the Chiefs" was given last year and it is the intention of the author and producer to make it an annual event. The Horn home provides just the right setting and stage effects will be introduced this year.

Rumors are steadily coming in that the old Oregon, Pacific and Eastern Railroad, operating a line from here to Disston, will soon be in the hands of new owners. The strongest bidders for the line seem to be Booth Kelly Lumber Co. stockholders, though it is understood the Southern Pacific Railway will also make a bid. A definite action is expected this week.

The old railway was built in 1899 during the Bohemia gold rush, but has for many years been used by the lumber companies. Booth Kelly owns the largest block of virgin timber east of Cottage Grove and this railroad would be an asset to the company in opening this timber tract.
