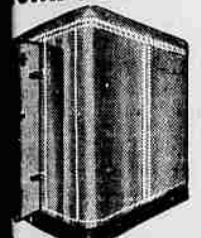

City Playground
Use Is Totaled

Since he city opened its 10 play-
ground areas to the public five
weeks ago, an average of 762 per-
sons have participated each day
in city recreation activities. These
figures make a total of 22,000 per-
sons, counting those who have re-
turned from day to day, who have
used the facilities.

Since the Anchorage Pool open-
ed, there have been 4901 paid ad-
missions and 1800 swimmers un-
der the Red Cross program, mak-
ing a total of 6701 persons who
have used the pool.

Miss Kitts gave the following
totals for each playground during
the five-week period: Condon,
1577; Edison, 1722; Frances Will-
ard, 2238; Lincoln, 1434; River
Road, 665; Whiteaker, 936; Uni-
versity Courts, 285; fairgrounds,
958.

Attendance at softball games at
the playgrounds was as follows:
AVC softball, 176; women's soft-
ball, 120; boys' softball, 617;
woodworking classes and related
classes, 880. Also figured in the to-
tal is the estimated 1000 persons
who danced or were spectators at
the dance on the College Hill res-
ervoir.

Six TB Cases
Found in Lane

Only six cases of active tuber-
culosis were uncovered as a result
of the second tour of the Mobile
X-ray Unit in Lane County.

A total of 4168 miniature chest
X-rays were taken by the Lane
County Mobile X-ray Unit in Lane
County during the periods, April
2 to May 11, when the unit operat-
ed in the eastern part of the coun-
ty, and May 20 to 24, when pic-
tures were taken at the University
of Oregon.

Of this total, 102 subjects were
advised to return for larger
X-rays. Up to now 88 of these
have done this, leaving only 14
unaccounted for.

In addition to the six TB cases,
20 cases of other chest pathology
were discovered. These included
rheumatic heart, enlarged heart,
tumors, and cancer.

The cost of the second tour of
the unit was \$1680.80 plus about
\$100 for allied expenses.
