## Morse Co-Author of Bill To Finance Cost Surveys

## Canadians Fear 'Quakes'

READ ISLAND, B.C.—(AP)—Jittery residents kept their ears to the ground here Saturday, alerted by continued underground rumblings in the wake of a violent earthquake.

"Some fear a volcano is forming beneath their homes," one farmer said.

Experts blamed rock slips along jagged faults which created a 30-foot cliff across one farm here June 23. Unexplained was a blow hole on a nearby sand spit which spewed sand and gravel widely, and left a deep crater.

Residents said they had been unable to reach bottom during soundings.

Government experts who toured nearby Vancouver Island after last month's strong northwest 'quakes have been asked to inspect this island, 100 miles north of Vancouver.

"Rumblings still are going on without let up, Stephen K. Marshall said, describing the subterranean noise as like "roar of city traffic in the distance."

Seismologists earlier fixed epicenter of the June tremors as near Read Island at Campbell River. Three deaths were blamed on the shocks.

Dwellers said that not only have areas of the island dropped 30 feet below normal level, but lakes have formed in the craters, fringed by huge, uprooted trees.

Across Georgia Strait on Vancouver Island, hundreds of tons of beach cliffs dropped into the sea during the recent quake, swamping one boat and drowning its occupant.

## Arizona Meteor Cluster Left Mile-Wide Hole, Pruett Says

Siberia's huge meteorite, which struck the earth 38 years and one day before the explosion of the first bomb of Bikini, was recently discussed. Another meteoritic bomb, surely far mightier than the Siberian, roared from the skies in prehistoric times and tore out the immense crater in the level desert plains of Arizona 20 miles from Winslow.

Meteor crater in Arizona is today a hole almost a mile in diameter, 600 feet deep and with an elevated rim about 150 feet above the surrounding plain. The level strata of sandstone and limestone, which underlie the surface in this general locality outside the crater, have inside been crushed and tilted to a depth of approximately 1,000 feet. Much of this has been ground into a white and exceedingly fine "rock flour." Huge boulders are mixed with the finer material in the elevated rim.

Coon Butte, as this crater is known, was first noticed by white men around 1880. Geologists long maintained that it was the result of a steam blow-out, originating from beneath the surface.

Early this century, Dr. D. M. Barringer, a Philadelphia mining engineer, championed the theory that it was a meteorite crater. Most scientists opposed him bitterly. But during 20 years of opposition Dr. Barringer remained firm in his original contention. Finally the scientists gradually began to change their ideas, and today it is said that noted geologists, physicists and astronomers are practically unanimous in their belief in the meteoritic origin.

That a meteorite caused the mighty disturbance now seems well-nigh irrefutable. In the center of the crater deep borings show that the rock strata are practically undisturbed below 1000 feet. Meteoritic material has been encountered at 1,350 feet under the southern rim, and magnetic tests indicate the main mass is likely buried there. Actual meteorites, millions of them, weighing from a few grains to over 1,000 pounds have been found on the crater floor, in the rim and on the outside plain for five miles—and more—in every direction. The nearer to the crater, the more numerous are these finds. It is said that more pieces of meteoritic material have been collected here than in all the rest of the world together.

The descent of this great meteorite—or swarm of meteorites—is now believed to have come from the north at an angle of about 45 degrees between 20,000 and 50,000 years ago. Dr. H. H. Nininger, the international authority in matters meteoritic, believes the great force of the impact resulted in a real, although incomplete, explosion. In his little book, "A Comet Strikes the Earth," he states that the explosion caused an earthquake for hundreds of miles in every direction.

The Arizona meteorites are of the metallic type, composed almost entirely of iron and nickel. Small quantities of other materials are present, including platinum and diamonds.

## China's 'Trotsky' Turns Up After 15 Years in Soviet Prison

SAN FRANCISCO —(AP)—The nearest thing to a Leon Trotsky in Chinese communism is a short, erratic, florid-faced man in his fifties named Li Li-San.

His name may become well-known, because like Trotsky he lost out in a bitter party row years ago—but unlike Trotsky, he has gone back.

That is, he has gone back as far as Manchuria, where Associated Press Correspondent John Roderick found him the other day in Harbin. Li was using another name, but readily admitted he was the one-time radical tough guy of Chinese communism.

He may have changed, as he seems to be getting along all right with Communist Commander Lin Piao, but he arrived from Russia not long ago and already his influence seems apparent in Manchuria, says Roderick.

Helped Found Party Li was educated in France and was one of the founders of the Chinese Communist Party along with Mao Tse-Tung, the present Stalin of China. After the conservative faction of the Kuomintang outlawed all Communists in 1927, friction developed between the two as to how to fight the Communist battle.

Li Li-San originated what was known as his "line" of tactics and strategy. He wanted to attack cities, fight big battles, and be tough with the people who lagged in the revolution. Mao said no, that Chinese Communists had to work slowly and carefully with the people—particularly the peasants—win their support, and not waste strength in big battles against better-armed enemies.

Li was blamed for the unsuccessful Communist attack on the city of Changsha in 1930, which got Chiang Kai-Shek's Kuomintang government so steamed up that he launched his first big military campaign against the Communists. Both sides lost heavily, and Li's uncautious line was discredited enough that he found it advisable to go to Moscow to "study." He stayed there until he recently ap-

and reached Paris at the beginning of a revolution in the art world. Meanwhile, she was writing, and, as she put it, "willing to wait." She wrote in her autobiography that, "in those days she never asked anyone what they thought of her work, but were they interested enough to read it."

Between the first and second world wars she published "Geography and Plays," "The Making of Americans," "Composition as Explanation," "Useful Knowledge," "Acquaintance with Description," "Lady Church Amably," "How to Write," "Matisse Picasso and Gertrude Stein," "Operas and Plays," containing "Four Saints Three Acts," which was set to music by Virgil Thompson and produced in New York in 1934. And "Autobiography of Alice Toklas," which really was Miss Stein's own autobiography.

Miss Stein spent most of her life abroad, principally in France, and did not return to the United States for a visit until she had been away 31 years.

## Tax Cutting Under Study

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A study to determine if individual income taxes can be cut next year—and if so, how much—is now underway by the joint congressional Internal Revenue Committee, it was learned Saturday.

The committee also is looking into all aspects of corporate tax changes which might serve as an incentive to industrial production without impairing the government's income.

But its findings may wind up in a congressional pigeonhole. President Truman has said emphatically that present high tax rates should be retained next year in an effort to balance the budget and perhaps pay off a bit of the \$268,281,000,000 national debt.

The committee's study therefore is only a "preparedness measure" in case Mr. Truman has a change of heart or Congress decides to do something about it regardless.

The outcome of the November congressional elections may have a strong bearing on tax cuts next year. Top-ranking House Republicans are issuing statements saying in effect: "Elect a Republican Congress and we'll cut your taxes by 20 per cent."

The House Ways and Means Committee, where all tax legislation originates, has before it several bills aimed at dropping the wartime increases in excise taxes on items such as furs, theater tickets, long distance phone calls and jewelry. But the committee has considered none seriously and they are fated to die when Congress adjourns next week.

Some Ways and Means Committee members indicated that thought might be given next year to elimination of the wartime excise boosts.
