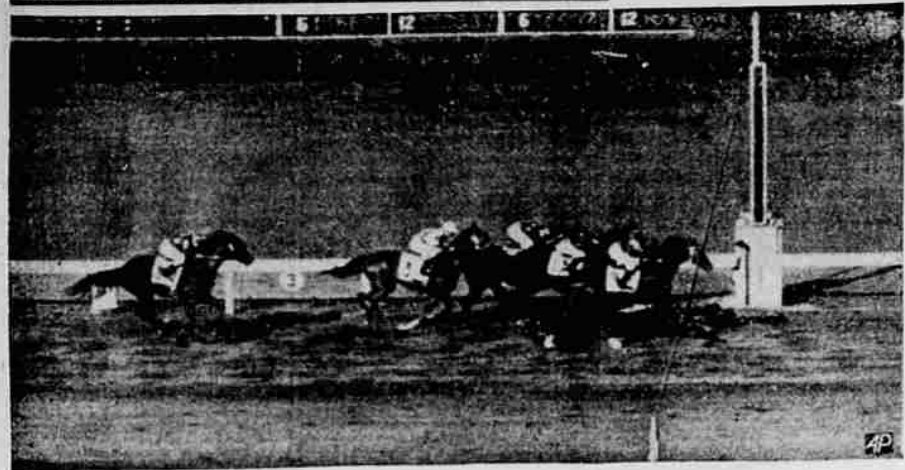

Feller Pitches 19th Win For Indians; Cards Gain Yanks, Bosox Split Pairs

Unless Cleveland's Bobby Feller or Detroit's Hal Newhouser hits an unexpected decline, there appears a good chance that the American League will furnish two 30-game winners this season.

Not since 1912 when the immortal Walter Johnson and Smokey Joe Wood reached the 30-victory mark did two great pitchers come along with such peerless parallel performances.

Following on the heels of Newhouser, who became the majors' first pitcher to win 20 games Saturday, Feller racked up his 19th triumph Sunday by shutting out the Washington Senators 2-0 in the opener of a doubleheader.

The Indians also won the nightcap 7-4 to advance within three games of the fourth place Nats.

Newhouser, needing only five more victories to join Cy Young, Lefty Grove and Johnson as the only American League pitchers to win 25 or more three years in succession, was idle Sunday as the Tigers divided a doubleheader with the Philadelphia Athletics before a capacity crowd of 51,116 which enabled the Bengals to climb over the million mark in home attendance.

Hard-luck Dizzy Trout went down to his third straight shutout defeat as Jesse Flores scattered seven Bengal bingles in pitching the A's to a 2-0 win in the opener. Frank "Stubby" Overmire spaced seven hits to defeat the Mackmen in the nightcap 6-2.

The pace-setting Boston Red Sox maintained their 11-game lead over the New York Yankees by gaining an even split with the St. Louis Browns. After Denny Galehouse had stopped them 3-2 in the first game, the Sox stripped six St. Louis chukkers for 13 hits and an 11-4 triumph in the afterpiece.

The Yankees also had to come from behind to break even with the Chicago. Held to six hits in the opener by Johnny Rigney who blanked them 2-0, the New Yorkers hopped on Ralph Hamner and two successors for 11 hits and an easy 7-1 win.

The second place St. Louis Cardinals narrowed Brooklyn's National League leading margin to a game and a half by blanking the Boston Braves 2-0 while the Dodgers were behind humbled by Pittsburgh's Pirates 7-3.

The third place Chicago Cubs advanced to within six and a half games on first place by sweeping both ends of a twin bill from the Philadelphia Phillies 11-3 and 3-1. A seven-run first game helped Hank Borowy, returning to the mound after being knocked off the hill Saturday, to his fifth success.

Despite a pair of home runs by the Giants' Johnny Mize, which raised his league leading total to 22, the Cincinnati Reds downed the New Yorkers twice, 8-3 and 5-4.

Game Commission Announces State Hunting Season Dates

PORTLAND — (AP) — A general deer season from Sept. 28 to Oct. 25 for blacktail and mule deer with forked antlers was set for Oregon by the state game commission, five more days of hunting than was planned in tentative schedules announced earlier.

The elk season was postponed to Oct. 29, so as not to coincide with the extended deer hunting period. It will run to Nov. 29 on Rocky Mountain elk and to Nov. 14 on Roosevelt elk.

The commission cancelled the Willamette Valley two-day pheasant season because spring storms had made heavy inroads on the supply of birds.

The Baker County Muddy Creek area, open to elk hunters for a special Aug. 31-Sept. 2 period to cut down the large numbers of animals endangering ranch crops, was extended to take in the Klamath drainage area.

An open season on valley quail was set concurrent with pheasant seasons in Crook, Deschutes, Klamath, Coos, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Grant, and Wasco Counties.

Archery seasons for deer were set up in specified portions of the Deschutes game refuge, Sept. 28-Oct. 6 for either sex and in Canyon Creek refuge, Oct. 25-29 for either sex. Other special seasons: Summer Lake, Lake County—Oct. 26-Nov. 10, 800 permits for antlerless deer; Crooked Creek, Lake County—Nov. 4-10, 500 permits for antlerless deer; Cove area, Union County—Nov. 6-10, 300 permits for antlerless deer; Devil's Garden lava beds—Nov. 30-Dec. 4, 500 permits for antlerless deer; Burnt River—Sept. 22-27, 100 permits, deer of either sex.

The open season for Rocky Mountain elk was set at Oct. 29-Nov. 20 for area east of The Dalles-California highway with a bag limit of one elk of either sex, except east of Highway 19 and north of the north fork of the John Day River and Baker County line. Only bull elk having antlers may be taken there. The open season for Roosevelt elk is Oct. 29-Nov. 14 for bull elk having antlers less than forked antlers in area west of U. S. Highway 97, excepting Jackson, Tillamook, Curry, Coos, Douglas, Josephine, and Wasco Counties. Special elk seasons include the Troy area of Walla Walla County and a specified area on the east slope of the Blue Mountains in Baker County and in the Muddy Creek sector of Baker County.

Hunting of China pheasants will also be permitted in mid-Willamette valleys instead of the two-day season set earlier. Crook, Deschutes and Klamath Counties were also added to those open for valley quail.

Herman Barron Wins All-America Golf

Ernie Piluso Keeps World Belt By Holding Dusette' to Draw

Ernie Piluso retained his world light-heavyweight crown Saturday night as he held challenger Georges Dusette' to a draw. The capacity armory arena crowd had seldom witnessed such superb wrestling endeavor.

Determination was the keynote as each matman issued every power at his command. The champ's defense against Dusette's potent full nelson was impressive as was George's ability to avoid the clutch of Piluso's powerful headlock. Ernie's relentless force eventually wore down his stubborn opponent and Dusette' was left limp on the mat from a tightly clamped headlock, ending the first fall in 40 minutes.

Dusette' displayed astounding feats in taking the second fall. His efforts seemed useless, but Piluso finally felt the effects of the firmly applied full nelson in five minutes.

Piluso proved he was truly a champion in his most severe title test to date, although no deciding fall was registered.

Tex Hager's return to the local mat was warmly welcomed by the fans and Indian Ike Cazell attempted to make it a hot one, but failed. The tempo of the semi-final was comparable to the day's thermometer reading as Cazell issued the expected rough-house action. Such illegal measures fooled all set defenses and Cazell took the first fall in seven minutes with a Boston crab.

In two minutes the "Creswell cyclone" had the second fall, Cazell was left bewildered from Hager's perfected flying head scissors.

Continued speedy onslaughts prompted Indian Ike to resort to choking as a defense. When such attacks were also directed at referee Jack Poppenheimer, the official ended the action giving Hager the award on fouls.

The two one-fall opening events pitted Bulldog Jackson against Joe Wolf and Jack Pinto.
