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Student Saved From Crevasse

LONGVIEW, Wash., (U.P.)—How Larry Farnum, University of Washington student spent an hour and a half "in cold storage" during a climb of Mt. Helens was disclosed here Tuesday.

Farnum fell into a crevasse Sunday when a snow bridge he was crossing caved in, according to a report to the forest ranger station at Spirit Lake. He lodged head down 30 feet below the surface and remained there until his companion, another university student, rescued him. Farnum suffered minor abrasions but continued his climb to the top of the peak.

Jack Zimmerman, Roger Hallin and Bob Quibach of Longview assisted with the rescue.

Freighter Refloated, Proceeds to 'Frisco

PORTLAND—(U.P.)—The Luckenbach freighter Silverbow Victory was on her way to San Francisco Tuesday after having been grounded for two days near the mouth of the Columbia River, Luckenbach officials announced here.

The port of Astoria tug S. W. Lovell pulled the ship into deeper water Monday but failed to loosen her keel from the mud of the ocean floor.

Crewmen finally were able to turn her engines early Tuesday and the ship floated under her own power. The ship is due to unload here 2400 tons of lumber and general cargo at the San Francisco dock Wednesday morning.

On-the-Job Aid Bill Passes Upper House

A bill authorizing the Veterans Administration to reimburse state and local agencies for expenses incurred in rendering services in connection with the on-the-job veteran-training program was passed in the Senate July 29, according to a telegram from Senator Morse (R-Ore), sponsor of the bill.

"Pleased to inform you the Senate passed my bill S-2477," the Senator telegraphed. "My bill was approved by both the Veterans Administration and Budget Bureau. It now goes to the House of Representatives, and if passed there and signed by President, will result in great benefit to veterans as well as to state government agencies which now have no funds with which to pay for supervising this very important veteran program."

High Grade Timber Sold

Additional material for the manufacture of furniture and boxes, both critically short items, will be provided through a just-completed sale of Willamette National Forest timber, reports J. R. Bruckart, forest supervisor.

The sale provided the Mt. Jefferson Lumber Co., Portland, with 7,453,000 board feet of high grade timber which had a sale value of \$35,877. The timber, in the French Creek drainage, will be removed via the French Creek road to the company's mill at Lyons for manufacturing. The successful bidder for the sale operates the Mt. Jefferson Box and Veneer Co.

One-fourth of the sale price will go to the counties in which the trees stand, and will be in lieu of taxes, Bruckart said. An additional 10 per cent will be used for road construction within the counties. Total value of the logs when delivered to the mill pond is estimated at \$198,718, a large part of which will go into payrolls spent in Linn and Marion Counties, the supervisor said.

The company expects to start road construction immediately.

UO Grad Gets Post In Physical Education

A former Eugene man, Vernon S. Sprague, a graduate of the University of Oregon in 1937, has been named assistant professor of physical education in the university. He will take over his duties on the campus at the beginning of the fall term.

Following his graduation from the university, he took graduate work at the University of Michigan and at the University of Southern California. In 1942 he received his master's degree at Michigan.

In 1941-1942 he was assistant to the board of control of physical education at Michigan. He held this position also from March of this year until the present time. Prior to his work at the mid-western school he was director of health and physical education in The Dalles public school. He entered the service in 1942 and served until early this year.
