August 9 Set For Air Meet

The Oregon State Aviation Council, a state-wide group formed to promote development of air parks, landing strips, and airport legislation, has scheduled an all day meeting to be held at the Eugene Hotel August 9, according to Mahlon Sweet, a director for the council.

Approximately 50 representatives of municipalities, private flying clubs, airlines and airports are expected to attend the meeting.

Speakers will include R. D. Bedinger, regional administrator, Civil Aeronautics Administration; W. C. Hill, Oregon State Board of Aeronautics; John P. Millin, president, Oregon Aviation Operators Assn.; C. A. Dunn, chairman of the city airport commission at Klamath Falls; Harry K. Coffey, member of the aviation committee, Portland Chamber of Commerce, and Leverett Richards, aviation editor, Oregonian.

Some topics to be discussed will include obtaining of funds for airport development, aviation from a municipal government viewpoint, gasoline tax refunds, removal of property tax on airplanes, flying public relations, the value of airports to communities and airport facilities throughout Oregon.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. and adjourn at 6 p.m. Interested persons who are not members of the council may attend, said Sweet.

Eugene Youth Sent to Forum

Jack Gunn, son of Dr. and Mrs. Henry Gunn, Eugene, left Thursday for Washington, D. C., as one of two Oregon representatives to the first American Legion National Forum. His companion on the trip is Jim Dunn of Corvallis.

The young Eugene High School student, who will take over the duties of student body president of his high school this fall, was chosen outstanding citizen at the Legion Beaver State Boys Camp at Corvallis recently.

Delegates will take classes in government at George Washington University, and hear talks by prominent government officials. In addition they will be guests at the White House for luncheon, make a trip to Annapolis by boat and visit many points of interest in and around Washington. Purpose of the forum is to give delegates a better understanding of the operation of the government.

Business Still On Upswing

Figures quoted by the Oregon Business Review for July show that the dollar value of business in the Upper Willamette Valley is on the upswing.

The Review arrives at its figures by checking bank debits, which are regarded as indicators of the general trend of business. For May 1946, the debits totalled \$56,600,818 while for the previous month the total was \$52,714,566. This represents a 7.3 per cent increase.

The increase over a year ago is even greater. The May, 1946 figure is 48.8 per cent larger than the May, 1945 total of \$38,037,819.

The publication of the University of Oregon school of business also shows that retail trading activity in Oregon last May was 2.4 per cent greater than in the previous month and 34.6 per cent heavier than in May, 1945. The figures were taken from a statewide sample of 403 independent retail stores.

Retail trade for the Eugene-Albany-Corvallis area was 7.8 per cent ahead of April, and 49.3 per cent above the figure for May, 1945.

Eugene Scout Trains At New Mexico Camp

A Eugene Boy Scout, Donald Furrer, of Troop 12, is training at Philmont Boy Scout Ranch near Cimarron, New Mexico. At the ranch, preliminary training includes burro training, horsemanship, back packing, axmanship and general camping techniques.

Scout Furrer, the son of Dr. and Mrs. E. D. Furrer of Eugene, is training with 25 other senior scouts from the Northwest. When he returns, he will report the activities to the scouts through troop and district courts of honor late in August.

Game Commission Asks Building Bids

The Oregon State Game Commission in Portland will receive sealed bids until Aug. 30 for construction of a building at the McKenzie Trout Hatchery near Lebanon.

The 16x24 building will be a grinding room and feed house for preparation of fish food. Present facilities have become inadequate for this operation.

SPRINGFIELD City Building On Increase

SPRINGFIELD — From a low of \$39,000 estimated value of building here in June, building permits for July scaled upward to \$82,300. C. M. Conning, building inspector, reports.

Average value of new residences likewise was increased from \$3700 to \$4468. Sixteen residential permits were issued during the month. The remaining 36 permits were for remodeling and construction of garages and out-houses. Residential permits totaled \$71,500.

Although there was an increase in building activity during July no permits for business construction were issued.

Announces Resignation

SPRINGFIELD — Frank Morris, manager of Springfield Plywood Corp., this week announced his resignation. He will be succeeded by Arthur Karlen, who recently resigned from a position with the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co.

Karlen also is associated with his brother in the Eatonville, Wash., Lumber Co. Morris has no plans for entering another business immediately. He and his wife will continue to make their home here.

Much Flax Expected

SPRINGFIELD — The Oregon Fiber Flax Assn. plant expects over 1000 tons of flax will be received during August from its 35 member-growers, who now are harvesting a slightly larger crop than that of last year.

Gus DeVos, manager of the plant, reports a crew of 30 men are working at the plant, east of Springfield, to prepare the new crop for marketing.

It is expected that only about half of this year's crop will be retted before fall rains begin. Scutching of part of the crop retted this summer will begin in the winter, DeVos said.

Retting is a process of fermentation to separate the wood fibers from the marketable flax. Scutching is a process of whipping to separate the fibers, the manager explained.

Street Department Needs Two New Men

SPRINGFIELD — The city street department needs two more men, according to Paul Basford, commissioner.

Not only does the department need two more men, but, with money provided in the new budget, it can hire them, if they can be found.

The new budget allows one commissioner, an assistant, a laborer, and an additional \$5000 for extra help. With regular duties of street and sewer cleaning plus ever-increasing number of streets to be repaired the present crew is kept busy.

Soon additional work will be piled on the force with the regular cleaning of the streets. While the department actually does not do the cleaning, it must be supervised and kept moving by the regular crew, Basford states.

CONTRACT OPENED

SPRINGFIELD — Local Union 5-246, IWA-CIO, has opened contracts for wage negotiations with 25 mills and logging camps in this area, it was reported Thursday by Max Gardner, financial secretary.

The local here has given the international union authority to negotiate. As yet the specific wages to be asked have not been decided, Gardner says.

UO Grad Appointed Dean at Harvard

The appointment of Dr. William H. Burton, a 1916 graduate of the University of Oregon, to be dean of the Harvard University graduate school of education, was announced this week.

This is the first time a westerner has been named to a position of prominence in the Harvard school of education.

Dr. Burton was also appointed director of the Harvard University summer school.

After receiving his master's degree from Columbia University, Dr. Burton taught at Oregon College of Education at Monmouth. He has served as professor of education at Washington State College, University of Puerto Rico, University of Chicago, University of Cincinnati, and University of Southern California.

For the last two years he has been director of teacher training at Harvard.
