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Fringe Control Need Is Seen

reality values but enhance them. Realty boards in the nation generally support zoning legislation heartily and farmers back it, too, if such laws do not try to go too far.

Zoning Seen As Aid

Bowes explained that fringes sometimes develop because people establish homes outside cities to get away from crowding and other metropolitan conditions they don't like. But soon they find that because of expansion inside and outside, the cities are right on top of them and they are in the midst of the very problems they tried to get away from, with no means of solving those problems. Zoning power is proposed to help these areas avoid such problems, said Bowes.

There was frank discussion at the dinner session and Harry Ray of Bethel made a plea for more general consultation of people in rural areas on problems affecting them. Too often, he declared, residents of these sections do not know what is contemplated until it is about to happen and then they do not have time to understand it. Bowes explained that the county zoning boards would be composed entirely of representatives of rural areas.

Frank Kinney, former president of the Eugene Realty Board, suggested it would be hard to sell people in rural areas on restrictions. If a man wants his investment protected against unwelcome adjoining developments he should buy in a district with deed restrictions, Kinney said.

Eyer Brown of the Springfield Planning Commission and dean of the school of architecture and allied arts at the University of Oregon, warned that in some zoning there is a tendency to confuse zoning power and police power and said the two should not be allowed to overlap in attempts at regulation.

John Quiner, engineer for draft proposal submitted by the foreign ministers in view of the fact he was the first to oppose it. School Merger Petitions Filed

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Bailey Hill has been struggling with a growing enrollment in a school building which is limited in space. Last year a basement room was used in the three-teacher system. The district voted for consolidation with six others in May, which later was dissolved.

If consolidation is approved by both Eugene and Bailey Hill and if previous practice is followed, students in the Bailey Hill district who live closer to the Magdaly school may attend there and those living closer to Lincoln school may be sent there. Seventh and eighth graders would attend junior high school in Eugene and the Bailey Hill school would be kept in operation for sixth graders only.

At the election there also will be a vote on the question of adjusting assets and liabilities of the two districts, the issue being whether the enlarged Eugene district would take over the assets and assume the liabilities.

One problem to be met if the districts consolidate is that of transporting Bailey Hill students. The Eugene buses at present are used about to capacity.

The election Aug. 26 will be held at 8 p.m. in the Bailey Hill school. In Eugene voting will be between 2 and 7 p.m. at the River Road, Willard and Dunn schools.

Members of the Bailey Hill school board are Marjorie K. Moore, chairman, Warren Coombs and George H. Todd, directors. Eta Dunlap is clerk.

Blame Fixed On Engineer

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission reported Tuesday that an engineer's failure to reduce speed in accordance with signals caused the collision of two Union Pacific trains at Hot Lake, Ore., on June 6. One person was killed and 115 injured in the accident.

A west-bound and an east-bound passenger train were ordered to pass each other at a siding at Hot Lake. The eastbound train failed to enter the siding and crashed head on into the other train, which was a standstill on the main track.

The report said the engineer at fault was assigned to "irregular service." His last passenger trip had been made about two months previously.
