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Timber Sold To Lane Mills

Sale of two tracts of timber,
 totaling more than 13,000,000 board
 feet with a value of \$59,780.30, has
 been made by Willamette National
 Forest to two Lane County lum-
 ber operators, reports J. R. Bruck-
 art, supervisor for Willamette.

Successful bidder for 11,180,000
 board feet of old-growth timber
 on McKinley Creek, a part of the
 drainage of the North fork of the
 Willamette River, middle fork
 near Oakridge, was the Edward
 Hines Lumber Co., and milling
 will be done at the company's
 Westfir sawmill.

Logging of the area, sufficient
 to keep the mill operating for
 about two and one-half months, is
 scheduled to start in the near fu-
 ture. Selling value was \$46,075
 and total value of the logs when
 delivered at the mill pond is ex-
 pected to be \$287,414.

This sale will be only a part of
 the estimated 50,000,000 board
 feet which the Westfir mill will
 cut this year, Bruckart said. The
 mill has been operated by the
 Hines company since its purchase
 from Blyth & Co. (successors of the
 Westfir Lumber Co.) in August,
 1945.

Alex Lilla of Blue River was
 successful bidder for 2,008,000 feet
 of timber on the McKenzie River's
 south fork, with a price of \$13,-
 705.30. Estimated value of the logs
 delivered at the mill pond is
 \$52,500. Bruckart points out that
 of this amount a large proportion
 will be payroll dollars in Lane
 County.

Local GOP Leaders Confer With Reece

James A. Rodman, Sr., of Eu-
 gene, chairman of the Republican
 Central Committee of Oregon,

 with Carroll Reece, chairman of
 the national GOP committee, who

Reece expressed confidence that
 the Republicans would take at
 least seven seats now occupied by
 Democrats in the Senate when
 the fall election ballots are
 counted, Rodman said. The na-
 tional chairman thought it pos-
 sible that the GOP would capture
 nine seats, enough for a Senate
 majority.

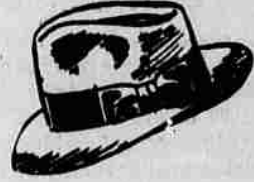

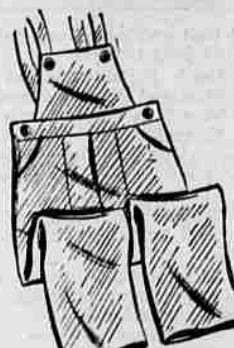

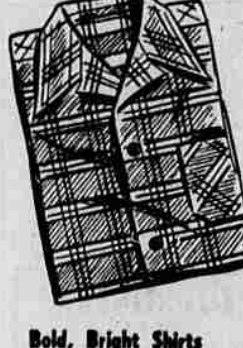
