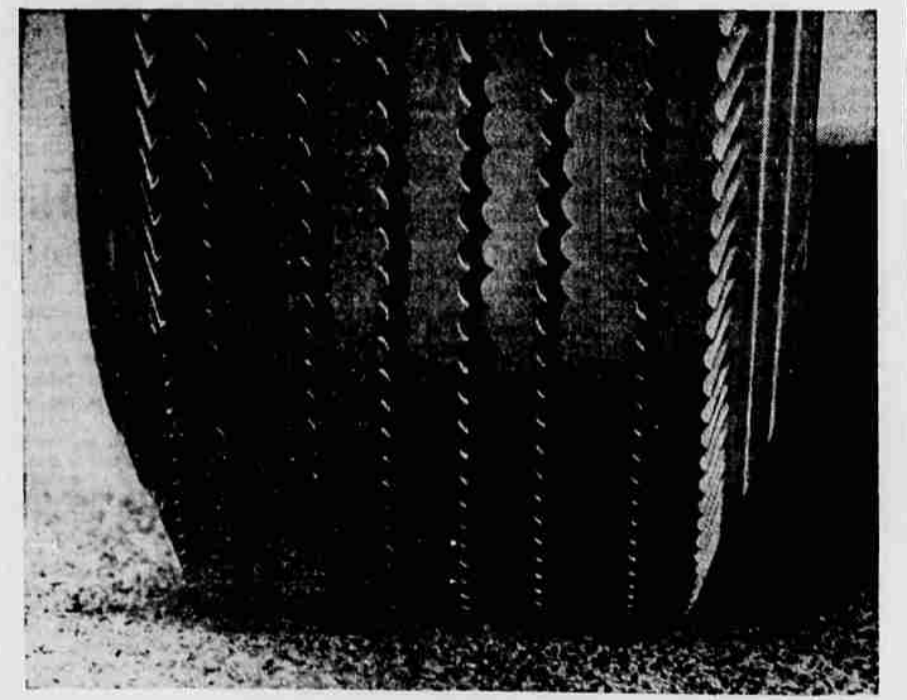

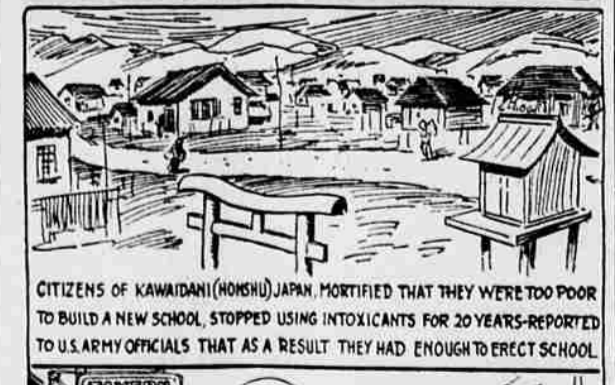

## Seconds Probe Motion

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Taylor (D-Idaho) said Wednesday that Henry Kaiser's statement welcoming an investigation of his war production record "emphasizes the need for a general investigation of war profits which were realized by the corporate giants during the war."  
"If the trail is followed carefully," said Taylor in a statement, "it will lead to the steel, rail, motor and power monopolies and to the National Assoc. of Manufacturers and the U. S. Chamber of Commerce."  
He declared that "we are becoming increasingly aware of the fact that these corporations enjoyed special advantages in dealing with the government because the government was represented in these dealings by the corporation's own men—temporarily wearing the uniform of the Army or Navy or sitting in dollar-a-year jobs."
