Business Women Advocate Stress On Social Training

A letter will go from the Eugene Business and Professional Women's Club to the State Board of Higher Education, urging that more emphasis be given to preparatory work for social service work in Oregon schools of higher education, to encourage Oregon young women to prepare themselves as welfare workers. A recommendation for this action was passed at a meeting of the executive board of the club Tuesday noon at the Eugene hotel.

No school in Oregon is prepared to furnish accredited welfare workers at the present time, it was stated, the nearest being the University of Washington at Seattle or the University of California, at Berkeley. The reason is not connected with size nor quality of Oregon schools, but lack of a large-enough city close by with accredited agencies which could furnish trained staff as supervisors, it is claimed. The thought brought forward by the local group of business women is that stress might be put on early guidance toward present undergraduate courses, as well as development of fuller courses when possible, to meet needs of post-war life. Later, it was suggested, Portland might afford opportunities for further field work.

Members were advised by the president, Miss Elizabeth Richard, to canvass for funds for the Park and Playground project soon.

A letter from Eugene Spinners, advising of the Charity Ball to be given August 16 at the Osburn Hotel as a benefit for the American Cancer Society, was read.

Recipe

(Recipes Serve Four)
Grilled Tomato and Mayonnaise
Dry bread crumbs
Mayonnaise
Worcestershire sauce
Salt
Few grains cayenne
Tomatoes cut in halves
Combine bread crumbs and mayonnaise until a thick paste is formed. Season it with Worcestershire, salt and cayenne. Spread thickly on tomatoes halves and place them in a buttered pan and broil for ten minutes at 425 degrees.

Chicken in Batter
1-3-pound roasting chicken
Boiling salted water
Vegetables (onion, carrot, parsley, celery)
2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
2 eggs
1 1/2 cups milk
Clean and cut chicken into pieces. Drop pieces slowly into boiling salted water to cover. Do not disturb boiling point, add vegetables for flavor. Simmer chicken until tender. Cool thoroughly. Dry pieces between towels. Prepare following batter. Sift flour and baking powder to-

American Recipes Said to Puzzle Overseas Brides

How many tablespoons of sugar are the 4 in an ounce? How many cups of brown sugar does it take to make up one pound? And what are all those alphabetical hieroglyphics in American cookbooks about?

That's just a sample of the culinary dilemma faced by the thousands of British war brides in the United States. Back home, they weighed all cooking ingredients—even spices—on a household scale. A capital "T" in a cookbook, meaning tablespoon to American housewives, might just as well be a question mark to them.

That's why Cecil Brownstone, family food editor of parent's Magazine has put together a sort of translation table which explains how many ounces of what go to make up how many tablespoons. Mrs. Brownstone first learned of the problem when a friend reported that a GI bride she knew was scouring the city for a pair of household scales to weigh sugar, fat, and other cooking ingredients.

The GI bride was stumped two ways—if she wanted to make one of her native English recipes, she didn't have the scales to measure with, and if she wanted to attempt something in an American cookbook, she didn't understand the measuring abbreviations.

Here's the table Mrs. Brownstone prepared to keep what's cooking on an even culinary keel:

Liquid Weights and Measures
3 teaspoons, 1 tablespoon; 1 fluid ounce, 2 tablespoons; 2 fluid ounces, 1 cup; 4 fluid ounces, 1 gill, or 1/2 cup; 8 fluid ounces, 1 cup; 1 pint, 2 cups; 1 quart, 2 pints, or 4 cups; 1 gallon, 4 quarts.

Equivalent Nut Measurements
(1 pound) unshelled almonds, 1 cup shelled kernels; filberts, about 1 1/3 cups kernels; peanuts, 2 cups kernels; pecans, about 1 1/4 cups kernels; walnuts, black, 1/2 cup broken kernels; walnuts, English, about 1 1/2 cups kernels.

Equivalent Cheese Measurements
1 ounce, 4 tablespoons, grated; 1/4 pound, 2 cups, grated; 1 pound, 4 cups, grated.

Equivalent Fat Measurements
1 ounce, 2 tablespoons; 2 ounces, 1/4 cup; 8 ounces, 1 cup; 1 pound, 2 cups.

Equivalent Flour Measurements
1 ounce, 4 tablespoons; 1 pound, 4 cups, sifted.

Equivalent Sugar Measurements
1 ounce, 2 tablespoons; 2 ounces, 1/4 cup; 8 ounces, 1 cup; 1 pound, 2 1/4 cups; 1 pound, 2 cups, brown, firmly packed.

Book Review

"Magic Gardens" by Rosetta Clarkson; The McMillan Company, N. Y.

Rosetta Clarkson asks if you have ever walked through an herb garden treading on sweet smelling thyme growing out between the stones; brushed against the spicy basil, the stimulating bergamot, the mints, the dill, the anise with scents so familiar? Then how could you have resisted rushing straight home to start an herb garden for yourself? One Eugenean hunger still for an herb garden of days gone by; remembers an exhilaration, an exaltation of soul and an enveloping contentment and a wholesome achievement of any other human effort.

An herb garden on a Fairmount hillside where the borage strewn its blue petals all about; a table in an apartment in one-time Bartle Court, covered with jars of dried herbs; friends who had become interested, their husbands, too, who never failed, when the jar of basil was opened, to draw a long breath and say "WHAT IS THAT?" Keats made no mistake in letting Isabella choose Basil for the bowl in which she kept her lover's head.

The windows of the shops along Willamette street have not, for a

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long time, shown the sorrowing maidens form embracing the bowl in which her lover's head was shrined.

The Roman soldiers who followed the orders of Caesar to conquer Britain, carried with them herbs from Italian fields and gardens and shores.

"Columbus sailed the ocean blue." A part of his cargo was composed of bundles of herb roots and seeds.

The Israelites tithed mint and anise; and cumin.
From Eden to Gethsemane the Bible mentions gardens: apples, olives, cumin, wormwood, others. The Revelation tells of a tree that bore fruit each month—also that was for the healing of the nations; one that offered fruit to him who conquers.

Mrs. Clarkson, who was a former school teacher, developed her herb garden and wrote a monthly pamphlet on herb culture during spare moments snatched from regular work. On retirement she secured a considerable acreage and has an extensive and lucrative business growing and selling herbs. Besides Magic Gardens she has written several other books on herbs.
