Swedes Study Ghost Rockets

STOCKHOLM—(P)—Swedish
military authorities plan to pub-
lish within the next few days a
communiqué on an investigation
they have been making of the
"ghost rockets" that have been
streaking daily over Sweden since
early July—leaving little doubt
that the country has become an
experimental target range.

Official sources have declined to
speculate on the source of the
mysterious spool-shaped missiles,
but it is generally believed that
the rocket-propelled objects come
from some place along the Baltic
coast of Germany. Only in a few
cases is it known that the mis-
siles actually landed in Sweden.

Between July 9-12 authorities
received 300 reports of the mis-
siles and since then reports have
poured in daily. Fragments ex-
amined by scientists gave little
in the way of clues, except to
indicate the presence of coke and
other common materials.

In general the rocket is de-
scribed as a small object with a
flaming tail, which speeds at
great height, making little sound.
The longest flight of any of the
missiles, so far as military ex-
perts could determine, was about
600 miles.

Wagner Act Changes Asked

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Gerard
D. Reilly Monday ended his
duties as a member of the National
Labor Relations Board by pro-
posing six changes in the Wag-
ner Act and its administration,
which he said would reduce strikes
and promote industrial welfare.

Reilly met for the last time
with Chairman Paul M. Herzog
and member John Houston. He
will go on vacation until his regu-
lar five-year term expires Aug.
28. His successor will be James
Reynolds of New York City.

Reilly said the Wagner Act had
reached its major objective of
reducing strikes, but that some
changes would reduce still fur-
ther the number of strikes for
representation and illegal objec-
tives, and the secondary boycott.

Two of the changes could be
made by NLRB amending its
rules and four would require con-
gressional action.

Changes Outlined

Reilly said the board should:

1. Give employers the right to
petition for bargaining elections
where a single union claims rep-
resentation rights and threatens a
strike without resorting to NLRB
procedures.

2. Give employers the right co-
relative with the unions to speak
freely during union-organizing
campaigns.

He said that Congress should:

1. Clarify the status of super-
visory employees.

2. Withdraw protection now
granted unions which strike for
objectives contrary to the act or
which would be achieved by its
orderly procedures.

3. Grant NLRB power to issue
process against unions engaging in
secondary boycotts.

4. Transfer the prosecuting and
enforcement functions of NLRB
to the Labor Department.

Reilly, who has dissented vigor-
ously from NLRB approval of the
unionization of foremen, said that
the issue should be settled by
Congress. He said the legislative
history of the Wagner Act showed
that organization of supervisory
employees was never debated.

prices was reported Monday by
the Eugene branch of the Pacific
