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**Sugar Stamp 49**  
**Expires Sept. 1**

Ration stamp Number 49  
(spare), which is good for five  
pounds of sugar, expires Sept. 1.  
The Eugene OPA office warned  
Wednesday. A new stamp will be  
validated for table sugar on Sept.  
1, it was announced, but the Eu-  
gene office has not yet been no-  
tified what the number of that  
stamp will be.  
The number 9 and 10 spare  
stamps, which are good for five  
pounds of canning sugar each, will  
expire October 31.

A warning was also issued Mon-  
day to restaurant and beer parlor  
operators that no increase in the  
retail price of beer has been grant-  
ed. The retail price is still fixed  
at the June 30 level, the OPA of-  
fice said, and anyone charging  
more is in violation of ceiling price  
regulations.

A slight increase in the whole-  
sale price has been granted, price  
control officials said, but that in-  
crease must be absorbed by the  
retailer.

A copy of Amendment 13 to  
MPR 2, Restaurant Regulations,  
has been sent to all restaurant  
owners, the price control office  
announced, and any restaurant  
owner who has not received it  
should contact the local office at  
once. The amendment grants price  
increases to restaurants on cer-  
tain food items, it was announced.

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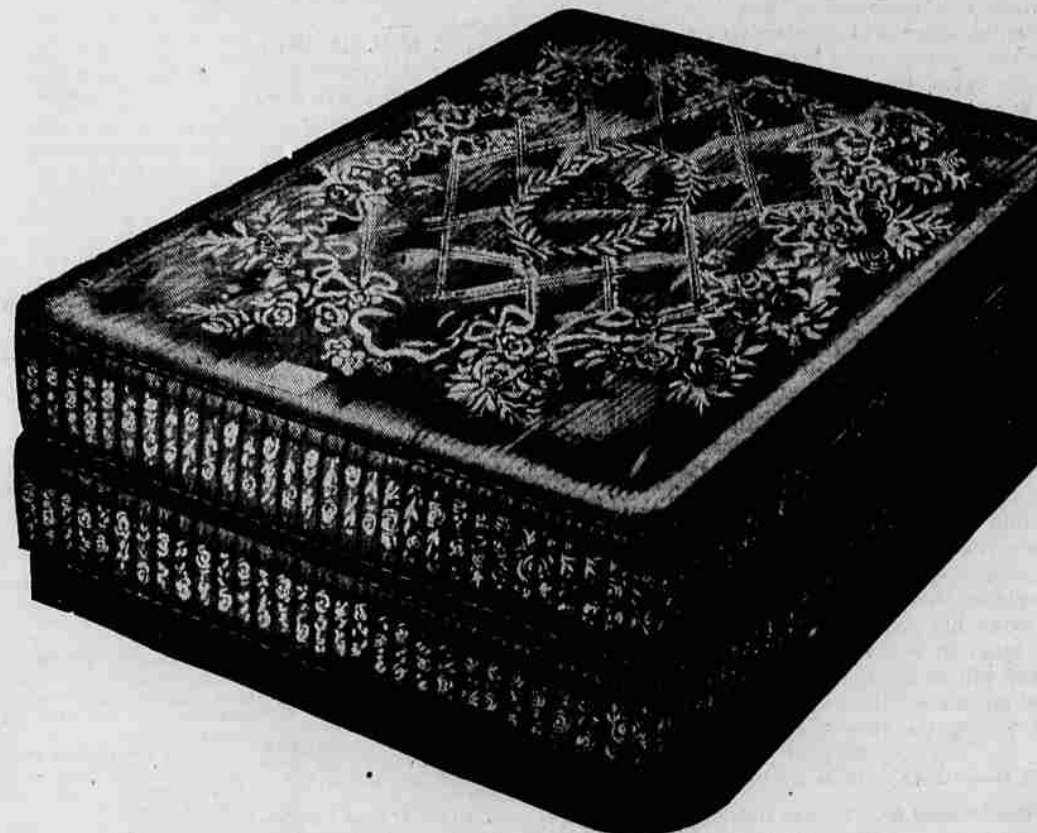
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
