Blandy Asserts U. S. Is Best Prepared

HONOLULU—(AP)—The United States is better prepared for atomic warfare than any other nation because of defense measures developed at the two Bikini tests, Vice Adm. W. H. P. Blandy told a civic meeting here.

Veteran ICC Official Dies

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Claude R. Porter, 74, member of the interstate commerce commission since 1928, died Saturday six days after the sudden death of a son, George B. Porter.

The commissioner collapsed at his office Thursday of a cerebral hemorrhage and was taken to a hospital. He died at 5 a.m., a few hours before funeral services were held here for the son.

Public announcement of the father's death was withheld until after the son's funeral to soften the shock of the second tragedy for the commissioner's widow, who had not been advised.

The son, a 54-year-old Washington, D. C., attorney, choked to death last Sunday night while dining at a hotel in San Francisco. A coroner's autopsy found that a bit of food had lodged in his windpipe.

troils more than half the remaining virgin timber stands in the region, must adopt a more realistic and workable formula to achieve the potential vast production which the region's forest lands are fully able to grow. "The report shows we have a permanent industry, and we mean to make it larger," the lumber leader declared.

Outlines His Formula

"We see in the Kirkland report a definite challenge and especially an out-right bid to the federal government to open up vast areas of dying old-growth and thus help reduce the three-billion-foot annual loss," Simpson stated. "This challenge is particularly strong at a time when private west coast log supply is declining in some areas and long-established mills are being dismantled—all within plain sight of vast areas of government-owned reserves of virgin timber with trees rotting everywhere."

To get his 13 billion-foot figure, Kirkland outlines and recommends an economically sound formula. From 320 billion feet of public and private timber operated on a sustained yield basis should come 3.2 billion feet; from 119 billion feet of private timber on a liquidating basis could come 5 billion feet, but he recommends a combined formula of sustained yield and liquidating which could produce 2.5 billion feet.

So, with no change in the present degree of utilization or federal controls, he foresees an annual cut ranging from 5.7 billion feet perpetually if all the timber were managed for sustained yield to 8.2 billion for the next 20 years only if the present proportions of sustained yield and liquidating forests are unchanged and use continues as in the past.

Asks Public Co-operation

Kirkland points the way to opportunities for much greater yields from west coast forests through co-operation of public and industrial forestry. With markets to pay for it, he says, relogging can add two billion feet annually to the west coast log harvest; through thinning of young stands an annual 2.5 billion feet in small logs and pulpwood can be added; and the salvage of over-ripe trees through advance logging would add another 2.9 billion feet to the annual cut.

If all these means of utilizing actual growth and saving rot loss could be fully employed, Kirkland states in his report, the west coast forests would supply 13.1 billion feet of timber annually and keep on a sustained yield.

The maximum production of west coast logs for all industrial purposes in 1929 was approximately 10.2 billion feet, Simpson pointed out. In the war years it held around 9.4 billion feet, dropping to an estimated 7.3 billion feet in 1945.

"A study of this scientific appraisal of our forests leaves no room for gloom, Simpson observed, "for it is clearly evident that we have the capacity here to produce even above normal demands for forest products, providing we can have co-operative support from public timber-controlling agencies."

Filberts Need Two Dustings

Filbert orchardists should spray or dust for control of filbert moth a second time this year because of the prolonged emergence period of the moth, W. B. Parker, assistant county agent, warned Monday.

This second application of spray or dust should be applied before August 24, Parker said, in exactly the same manner as the first, with careful attention being given to the tops of the trees and under sides of the leaves.

The proper spray for control of filbert moths is three pounds of lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water with a spreader, Parker explained. If the grower wishes to use dust, a 40 per cent lead arsenate dust applied 40 pounds to the acre will give control, he said. Dusting should be done in the early morning when the wind is calm, he added.

Health Authorities Draw Plans to Fight Any Show of Epidemic

PORTLAND—(AP)—Plans setting up emergency teams of orthopedic surgeons, pediatricians, nurse and physical therapists for use in case Oregon's annual siege of polio should reach epidemic proportions were in the blueprint stage here Saturday.

The plans were drawn up at a meeting of the State Advisory Committee of the State Health Commission. Officials of 10 co-ordinating agencies attended the conference.

Other features of the over-all polio plan were provisions made to form pools of physical therapeutic equipment and the establishment of 24-hour telephone service for assistance in emergency cases.

However, it was pointed out by Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, that Oregon with 40 cases of the disease cannot be considered to have reached the epidemic stage.

Creamery Gets New Manager

Glenn A. Harnden, who has been secretary-manager of the Eugene Farmers Creamery since April 1, 1933, Saturday resigned from that position effective Sept. 1. Harnden's resignation was submitted at the regular monthly meeting of the board of directors.

During the past 13 years that Harnden was manager of the Eugene firm its assets have increased from \$130,000 to over \$300,000. The membership has more than doubled with nearly 1400 members on the association's rolls at the present time.

Harnden made no announcement Saturday as to his future plans.

Fred A. Kesey, a Navy veteran from Colorado, was appointed Saturday to fill the vacancy created by Harnden's resignation.

Since his discharge from the Navy last March, Kesey has been plant superintendent at the Eugene plant. He will be succeeded in this position by Del Hoff, a former employe of the creamery.

Communists Mass Forces

NANKING—(AP)—Chinese dispatches from northern Kiangsu Province said Saturday that Chinese Communists had massed 100,000 reinforcements for a counter-offensive against Kiangtu (Yangchow) and Jukao.

Possession of the cities is important for control of the north bank of the Yangtze from Nanking to Shanghai. The dispatches said the reinforcements had been moved in from Kiangtung Province.

Meanwhile the government's Central news agency reported General Fu Chou-Yi had reached besieged Tating, in Shansi province, with reinforcements. The Nationalist garrison there was reported to have blunted repeated Communist attacks, now said to be showing signs of collapse.

General Marshall, special U. S. envoy to China, resumed conferences with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek at Kuling, Premier T. V. Soong joined in the discussions for two hours.

Americans Smoke 172 Billion Cigarettes In First Half of '46

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Americans are smoking themselves right into a new record.

The agriculture department said Saturday that 172,000,000,000 cigarettes were produced during the first six months of the year.

"If this rate continues for the rest of the year," it said, "the annual total will exceed any year on record."

The previous record was in 1945 when cigaret production totaled 267,622,000,000.
