Electricity Use Increases 13.1%

Customers buying electricity from the Eugene Water Board during the first six months of 1946 increased 892, or 7.7 percent over the total number for the same period of 1945, Harold King, assistant water board secretary, reported Saturday.

The figures, completed by King last week, showed that in the first half of this year 12,450 customers used 47,498,837 kilowatt hours of electricity, an increase of 5,486,523 kilowatt hours, or 13.1 percent over the consumption of 11,558 customers who used 42,012,314 kilowatt hours in 1945.

Water consumption increased also. Water customers served totaled 7005 in the first six months of 1946, an increase of 350, or 5.3 percent, over the 6655 customers during the first half of 1945.

The water figures, King explained, are much lower than for electrical service because one water meter ordinarily serves all families in a multiple dwelling.

In addition, areas outside the city are organized into separate water board districts and count as only one customer. These districts are supplied water on a wholesale basis, and in turn, sell water at retail price to hundreds of families.

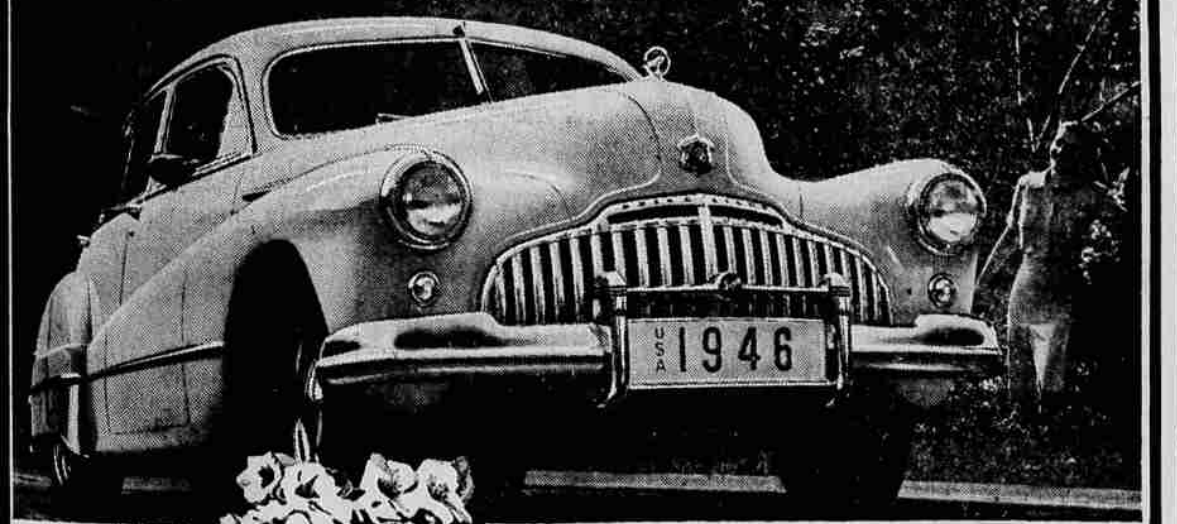
