Date Set on Soil District Vote

The election on the formation of the Lane-Linn Soil Conservation District will be held Nov. 15, from 2 to 9 p. m., Robert H. Warren, chairman of the State Soil Conservation Committee, ruled Monday night at a meeting held in the Harrisburg city hall.
 The meeting was called, Assistant County Agent W. B. Parker explained Tuesday, after petitions, signed by 56 land owners from the proposed district, were submitted to the state committee on June 21. Purpose of the meeting, he added, was to determine the feasibility and desirability of the proposed district.

Hugh Willoughby, Harrisburg, was elected polling superintendent and will take charge of arrangements for the coming election, Parker said. Willoughby will appoint a polling committee to assist him. Polling places will be set up in Halsey, Coburg and Harrisburg, it was announced.
 Parker pointed out Tuesday that a recent change in state laws provides that a soil conservation district may become effective and legal if it gains the support of more than 50 per cent of the landowners within the proposed district. Formerly, a second requirement was that the landowners supporting the district must own more than 50 per cent of the land within the proposed district, Parker explained, but that requirement is no longer in effect.
 The proposed Lane-Linn district
