

PA Clarifies Employee Status

Complete written classification of each job title in the department is the object of a program being conducted by the Bonneville Power Administration, Merrill J. Collett, Portland, Ore., director of personnel, said in Eugene Thursday.

Collett spoke to about 15 local employees Thursday morning, explaining the program's purpose and distributing questionnaires which each is to fill out, describing his own work.

The director explained that Bonneville feels the complete classification, believed to be the first of its kind covering all employees in any agency under the Civil Service Commission, will be of benefit both to employees and to the administration as a whole. He pointed out that about half of Bonneville's employees are under war service appointments and must take examinations for their status in new commission registers. The classification will help

The lone Eugene Chamber of Commerce entrant, Dick Welden of Cottage Grove, displayed more courage than any fighter to crawl through the ropes, in losing to Mill Enright of Milwaukee, Wis., a Golden Glove semi-finalist. Enright had the fight all of the way as southpaw Welden failed to protect his face. Dick showed a good left hand punch and jarred Enright upon occasion. Welden's face was blood smeared at the end as Enright pelted him with right and left hooks.

Equal Work, Equal Pay

Another reason for the undertaking is to see that all employees in the various divisions receive the same pay for the same type of work, Collett said.

The completed classification plan, containing specifications for each title, will be submitted to the commission for approval. Its completion will require going over about 1500 employee statements and supervisory comments, which will be sorted and analyzed. Employees as well as supervisors will have the right to comment on the final classifications, requesting adjustments on a personal basis.

At present, Collett is touring all Bonneville offices to acquaint employees with the plan. He has one assistant in the work, but also will have two or three from outside the administration who have experience with similar surveys and are familiar with the requirements of power agencies. They will help out about the end of September when questionnaires are returned.

The classification is expected to be completed as a "Christmas present" for the employees, Collett said.

Transportation will be provided for those who have no way of reaching the ranch.

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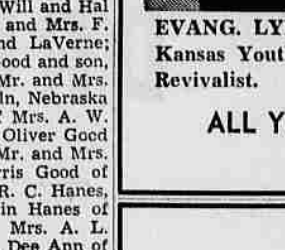
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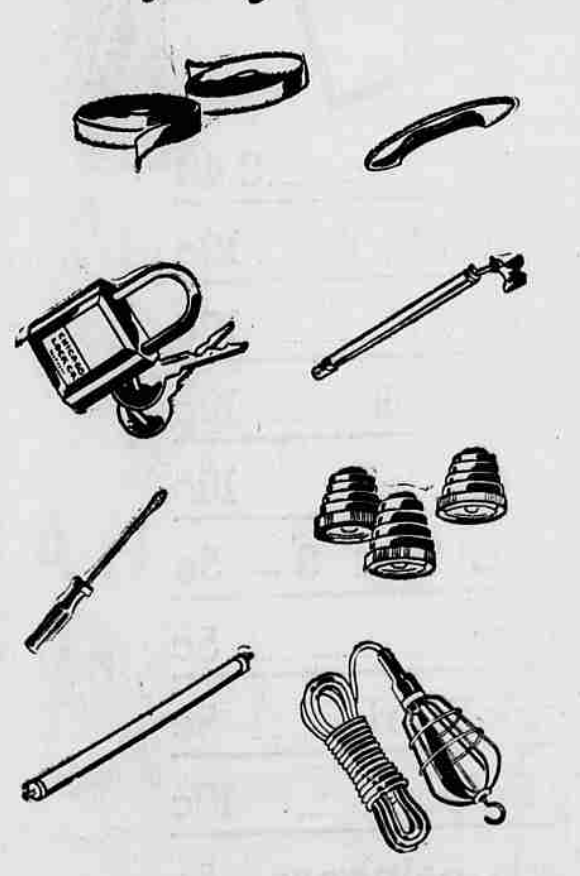
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
