Expires September 1

Housewives who have not used their number 49 (spare) ration stamp, which is good for five pounds of sugar, were given warning Friday by the Eugene price control office that they must do so before Sept. 1.

Also, OPA officials said, any person holding ration books issued to persons who are now deceased or persons who have left for military service should turn such books into the local OPA office.

A new sugar stamp will be validated Sept. 1, OPA heads said, but the number of the stamp has not, as yet, been disclosed. The number 9 and 10 spare stamps, which are good for five pounds of canning sugar each, will be valid until Oct. 31, it was announced.

McKenzie Bus Goes To One-Trip Plan
VIDA—Pete Jurich, owner of Pete's McKenzie Bus Co., announces a new schedule for the McKenzie Bus line starting Aug. 21 passengers are picked up in Eugene at one place only, the Greyhound Bus Terminal, corner of Pearl and Tenth Aves. W. Start-

ing Sept. 1, there will be only one round trip from Belknap Springs to Eugene daily, and the time schedule has been changed to give better service on the one trip schedule. Starting Sept. 1, the new schedule will be as follows: Leave McKenzie Bridge 8:30 a. m. for Eugene, and the return trip from Eugene will be 4:30 p. m. and Springfield 4:45 p. m.

Jurich states this his reasons for making this change is so he can maintain year-round service on the McKenzie. At present the number of passengers does not justify the expenses involved in making two trips daily.

Bridge Closed Near Grove

COTTAGE GROVE—The steel bridge over Row River, two miles east of this city, is closed to all traffic, beginning Friday, Aug. 23, according to P. M. Morse, county engineer. The bridge has been closed to heavy traffic for several days, but it is now necessary to make repairs which will take about six weeks. A detour is to be provided which will serve until the water becomes higher in the river, but it is recommended that traffic go up Mosby Creek to the Currin bridge.

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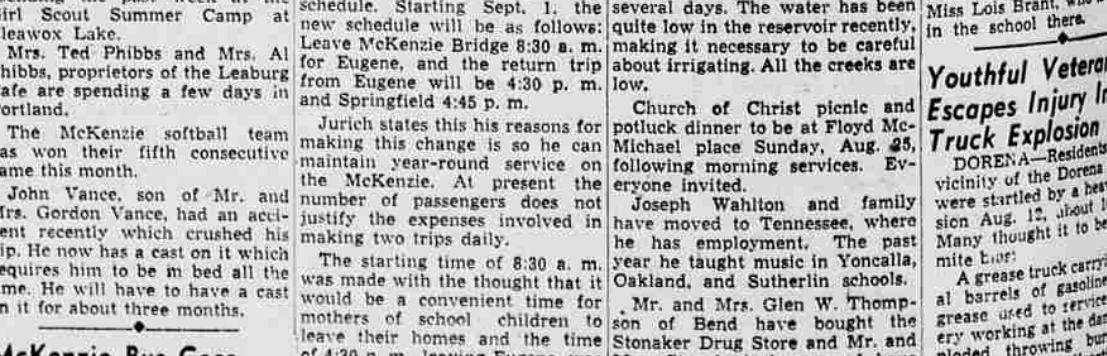
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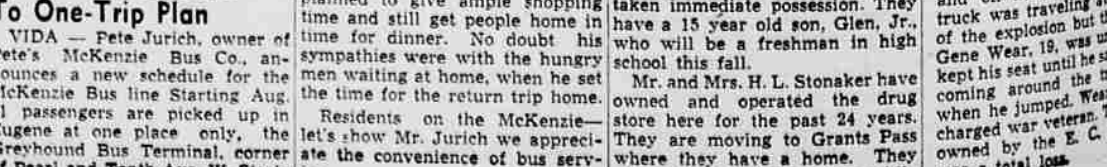
