The Cards fell behind when the Philadelphia Phils scored a run in the first inning of their night game. St. Louis knotted the count in the fourth and won in the ninth when Pinch Hitter Terry Moore singled in Whitney Kuroski from Beazley with two out. Johnny Oscar Judd the loser.

The Chicago Cubs defeated Boston 3-1 to increase their margin to three and a half games over the fourth place Braves.

The New York Yankees won their fifth straight when they defeated the St. Louis Browns 4-1 in a night game at the Yankee Stadium. Ernie Bonham, scattering six hits, was helped by Joe Gordon's 10th homer. The win reduced the American League leading Boston Red Sox margin over the Bronxites to 12 games.

PORTLAND GOLF CLUB, PORTLAND, Aug. 24—Eight National Junior leather pushers from British Columbia, Oregon, Utah, Montana and Massachusetts battled their way to victories in the finals of the three-day boxing tournament.

Portland, British Columbia, and Salt Lake City gained two crowns each, while Victoria, Vancouver, Meaderville, Fort, and Boston took the other titles. Some 3000 spectators were in the stands for the 22-bout program that included eight semi-final matches (2 minute rounds) and finale (3 minutes).

The entire program was action filled as the cream of the fistic crop slugged it out for the coveted gold medals. Four of the semi-final and two of the finals were won by KOs.

Best fight of the evening was the semi-final between Bill Sneddon of Ogden, Utah, and Harry Carvalho of San Diego, in the 160-pound class. It was a leather-tossing donnybrook from start to finish, but the judges awarded the match to the wrong fighter, Carvalho, who later was a TKO victim of Emmett Murphy of Meaderville. Murphy knocked out John Diehl with a left upper cut to the solar plexus in second round of a semi-final and then won with a TKO in the second.

Biggest disappointment was the defeat of Rocky Marchigiano of Brockton, Mass., in the heavy-weight finals. He had won two previous fights by first-round knockouts and then broke his left hand during the "nals" which went to Joe De Angeles of Boston who has won 38 straight, 25 by KOs.

Most popular fighter was tap-dancing and swift swinging Paul Perkins of Salt Lake City. The lanky 147-pound Negro won the finals by default when Walt Ryan of Dorchester, Mass., became ill after winning his semi-final bout.

Joe Wilkinson, hard-hitting Negro from Washington, D. C., lost a close decision to Don Stringer of Portland in the 126-pound finals—the division Eugene's Denny Quinn would have fought through.

The 112-pound finals was a hectic affair in which both boxers were knocked down and Vic Murdoch of Victoria eventually decided young Jay Beaumont, a fellow Canadian from Vancouver.

Two other Canadians fought for the 118-pound class, Stanley Almond of Vancouver scoring a TKO over his younger brother, Frank. Duane Smith of Lebanon, who failed to take advantage of a fine right hook, lost to Ed Tate of Portland in the 135-pound finals.
