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Lobbyist Law Effect Puzzling

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Eight West Coast chamber of commerce representatives in Washington will have to decide by January whether they are lobbyists in the eyes of the law or risk a \$5000 fine.

A ninth, Hugh A. Scott, representing the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, is in no doubt. He thinks he is.

The ultimate in chambers, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, wrestled in vain with the question, then put it to the attorney general. He has not answered yet.

C. J. S. Williamson, the California chamber representative, has a private lawyer working on it, but keeps an eye cocked for the attorney general's reply. He said "there's been a lot of back chat about it" among the undecided representatives of San Francisco, Los Angeles, Vallejo, San Diego, Sacramento, and Portland.

Their problem boils down to the chance that they might not be lobbyists. Congress said a lobbyist was one "who shall engage himself for pay or for any consideration for the purpose of attempting to influence the passage or defeat of any legislation by congress..." none of the chamber representatives makes this a full-time job, they said.

Anyone who fulfills that description, congress said in its reorganization bill, must register at the House and Senate and submit quarterly financial statements.

Local Lumber Yard In New Location

The McDaniel Lumber Co., retail yard, formerly located at 131 Eighth Ave. W. in Eugene, will open a new retail yard and display room at 240 River Road this Saturday.

Owners of the new retail yard are H. F. McDaniel of Eugene and B. L. Burroughs of Seattle, who will discontinue operation of the yard on Eighth Ave.

McDaniel said his new yard will contain Walter N. Joysen paints, builders' hardware, plywood, rough and finished lumber, doors, and electrical equipment. The company also will sell plumbing fixtures when they are available.

Open house will be held Saturday and sales will begin Tuesday, September 3.

Large Output Reported From Alcohol Plant

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Production of alcohol from pulp mill wastes at the Puget Sound Timber Co. plant in Bellingham now equals the annual output of all western alcohol plants prior to the war. E. C. Ericsson, a plant engineer, told the American Institute of Chemical Engineers at its annual convention here Tuesday.

Ericsson said the plant, only one of its kind in the United States, produces 2,000,000 gallons of high grade industrial alcohol annually from the waste liquors of its sulphite pulp mill.

71,000 New Oregon Phones Fail to Fill Need

PORTLAND—(AP)—Oregonians want telephones so badly that the telephone companies can't keep ahead of orders despite installation of 71,000 the past year.

Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Co. installed nearly 60,000 since Aug. 1 last year, but has 24,692 unfilled orders compared to 22,188 a year ago. Other companies report a similar situation.
