However, the following Tuesday, Sept. 10, riders will gather at 7 p. m. at the fair grounds, and ride to the Paul Waske home in College Crest, where a business meeting will be held at 8 p. m.

The Hunt Club will cooperate in furnishing entertainment features between events at the afternoon racing program during the fair. Although plans are not complete, club members will probably be asked to make up show classes and do exhibition riding, according to Mrs. C. A. Huntington, who is in charge. Buck Abbott, who held the world's championship in roping until his induction into the Army, is to perform rope tricks as a part of the entertainment.

Stable Space at Premium
Mrs. Huntington, who is also in charge of all model and breeding classes at the fair, both light and heavy horses, urges owners to register their entry blanks as soon as possible, as stable space will be at a premium and preparations must be made soon.

In the classes for light horses, which include American saddle bred, Arabians, walking horses, and quarter horses, registration papers will be necessary, either full registration or half-breed registration. Horse judging will start at 10 a. m., Wednesday, Sept. 25, the first day of the fair. Blue ribbon winners will probably be required to parade in front of the grandstand on closing day.

a distance of nearly two billion miles from the sun and is making its round trip every 84 years. But it is traveling incognito, so far as old astronomy books are concerned.

On the evening of March 13, 1781, the accomplished organist and music teacher, William Herschel of Bath, England, who later became Sir William Herschel, one of the most noted astronomers of all time, was viewing the starry heavens through a telescope of his own making. He chanced upon a "star" which seemed a little wider than was usual for these point-like bodies. He suspected he had found a comet. Watching it from night to night, he noted that it moved among the fixed stars. He soon reported his find to the astronomer royal of England, and very shortly it was established that the musician had actually discovered a new planet, nearly twice as far from the sun as Saturn, the most distant previously known.

Planet Becomes Famous

Herschel's name immediately flashed into the news. One writer said, "At one bound he leaped from obscurity to fame." Learned societies awarded him medals and voted him into their membership. Early the following year, King George III requested an audience with him, and was delighted with the views of Jupiter and Saturn obtained through Herschel's excellent telescope. Soon Herschel was appointed King's Astronomer and, giving up his musical profession forever, spent the last 40 years of his 84-year life in efficient astronomical research, aided by excellent telescopes provided by the government.

In naming the new planet, Herschel was anxious to honor his royal patron, so suggested that it be called Georgium Sidus. Perhaps King George himself would have been proud to have his name emblazoned on a spinning planet and whirled around the far reaches of the solar system. But the astronomers of continental Europe objected strongly to restricting this splendid new planet to the English crown. They could have none of it!

As a temporary compromise, at the suggestion of the Frenchman Lalande, the name of the discoverer was for a while used in connection with the new object. But this was not entirely satisfactory for all the other planets carried the names of ancient Greek and Roman deities. Finally at the recommendation of the German astronomer Bode, planet Herschel became Uranus, the name universally used today.

Civil Service Reports Marine Examinations

Federal civil service has announced examinations for permanent probational appointments to firemen, marine oiler and other marine positions. Persons desiring positions in federal service with permanent classified civil service status may file for the examinations in the Portland Engineer District.

Entrance salaries for the two positions are \$1.22 hourly for fireman, and \$1.28 hourly for oiler. Grading will be on basis of experience and training without a written test. Applicants must be between the ages of 18 and 62, though limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service employees. Atomic Power Use Said Near

SEATTLE — (AP) — A prediction that atomic power will be produced at Oak Ridge, Tenn., within two years and be "a big, going industry with many practical applications" within 25 years was made Tuesday night by Bruce R. Prentice, assistant to the manager of general electric's apparatus department, before a Pacific Coast meeting of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers.

Introduced as the man who is "coordinating atomic energy projects in all parts of the United States," Prentice said he believed the first practical use of high cost atomic power will be on ships, particularly Navy ships. Commercial applications would come to other fields in this order, he predicted: for exploiting parts of the world where power lines and coal are not available; for emergency power plants; for public utilities and lastly, for land and air transport.

He said transportation by land and air was placed last because of the shield needed to provide protection from radio-activity of the "pile"—the heap of fissionable materials from which plutonium is created.

Regarding the Hanford, Wash., plant which General Electric is to take over Sept. 1, Prentice said the company will continue DuPont's program for producing plutonium, "the stuff of which the atomic bomb is made."

Schools in Portland To Get More Money

PORTLAND — (AP) — Portland's schools, which had been assured of "not less than \$400,000" in federal Lanham Act funds, will get at least \$100,000 more, Sen. Morse has been advised by George H. Field, commissioner of the Federal Works Agency.

Field, in his letter to the Senator, said \$500,000 was not necessarily the top figure, but that until the needs of other schools were determined no higher commitment could be made.

Morse said that while the FWA is following a fair and proper course, "We in our own state have not raised adequate funds for our school needs. This is a matter for local solution. We cannot expect the federal government to do the entire job for us."

Danebo Youth Burned In Stove Explosion

DANEBO—Explosion of a gas-line stove at the home of J. O. Grover of Route 5 Tuesday severely burned John Grover, 13. The five Grover children were home at the time of the accident and the uninjured children wrapped John in burial and threw the burning stove out of the house.

The youth was taken to Eugene Hospital with third degree burns on his face and body. His condition was reported as "good" Wednesday morning.

The Grover family recently moved to this community from Lake City, Mich.

Krug Favors New Statehood

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary of the Interior Krug proposed Tuesday that "Hawaii and Alaska be admitted to the Union together as the 49th and 50th states."

He expressed hope that Congress in January will start the necessary machinery in motion, along with a bill to permit the people of Puerto Rico to vote on whether they want independence, statehood or dominion status.

Krug, recently returned from an 11-day inspection tour of Alaska, which he called "America's land of opportunity," told reporters he found sentiment strongly in favor of statehood.

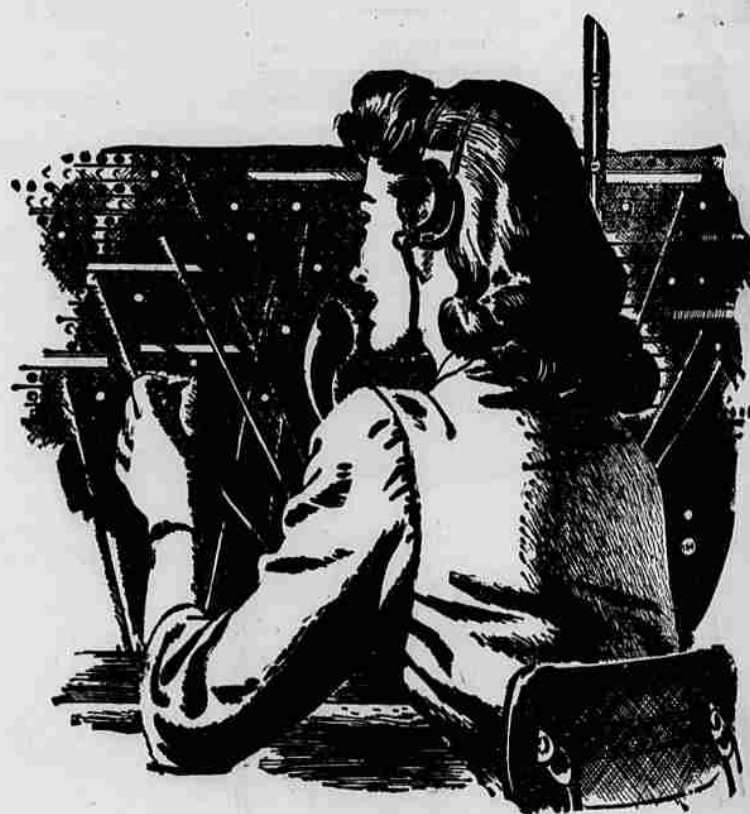
