

Students Sign At Teen Canteen

Registrations are being accepted now at the Community Center for Teen Canteen activities for students of high school and junior high schools.

All students have been urged to register as soon as possible, due to resumption of canteen activities Friday, Sept. 6. Admission cards will be necessary to gain admission to the weekend dances. Old registration cards will be invalid Sept. 6.

A registration desk has been placed in the Community Center for registration, and letters have been sent to 1800 high and junior high students who were members of the canteen last year.

Redecorating, painting, and installation of a new soft drink bar have necessitated closing the weekend dances since Aug. 23.

Registration cards must be filled out before Sept. 6 for junior high students, and Sept. 7 for seniors. Junior canteen dances are held Friday evenings at the center, and members of the senior canteen take over each Saturday night.

Although the center is being redecorated, the building remains open as usual daily until 10 p.m.

Auto Black Mart Target

WASHINGTON—(AP)—OPA is bolstering its automobile enforcement staff with 200 additional agents in a drive to crack down on what an official described as a "nationwide black market" in motor car sales.

Disclosing this Wednesday, William E. Remy of the agency's auto enforcement branch said "there is no particular place where violations of price ceilings are not going on." With the 200 additional agents, the OPA will have 600 in the field.

Investigations to date, Remy told a reporter, have turned up such things as these:

Some new cars have been sold as high as 100 per cent or between \$1500 and \$1800 above OPA established price levels. In the majority of such sales, however, the average illegal price ranged between \$400 and \$500 above the OPA top.

In cases investigated, "one out of every five dealers turned out to be violating price regulations."

Sonora Fire Defies Control

SONORA, Calif.—(AP)—Spread in one instance by a flame-covered deer, a brush fire burned out of control Wednesday in a half-mile area at the western edge of Stanislaus National Forest after having swept over 4500 acres since Monday.

Nearly 800 men, employing bulldozers and fire-fighting equipment, battled the blaze in difficult terrain only to see new fires started by wind-blown sparks leap as much as a mile and a half across firelines.

The fire was out of control six miles northeast of Columbia at a point where it now threatens valuable timber.

One of the peculiarities of the ruffed grouse is the odd drumming noises it produces in the springtime to attract attention.

Justice Department Looks Into Monopoly

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The justice department said Wednesday it is investigating identical bidding and monopoly practices in the sale of many products bought in vast quantities by federal, state and city governments.

An official declined to specify the items involved but said they are products essential to government operations and to public health and safety.

Presumably the list might include such things as motor vehicles, electrical equipment and building materials, although it was emphasized that not all manufacturers or dealers in any one product are suspected of illicit practices.

The probe stemmed from complaints of identical bidding, he said, adding that agents who followed up these complaints uncovered evidence of alleged conspiracies and monopolies in the sale of many items.

Two anti-trust actions already have been filed as a result of the preliminary inquiry and others probably will follow soon, the official said.

Boys Report On Legion Trip

Recreation, education and political programs held at the Beaver Boys State were discussed by three of the five representatives to the State which was held in Corvallis during July at Lions Club Thursday noon.

The recreational program, described by Gerald Honey of Woodrow Wilson Junior High, consisted of two periods of swimming each day, baseball games, tennis, basketball and football. Those attending were divided into two political parties, Federalists and Nationalists, furnishing the competition.

Classes in history, government and geopolitics comprised the educational program, said Garvin Crabtree, Eugene High School. Various government and reform movements were studied as well as the connection of politics and geography.

Jack Gunn, who also spoke about the national government forum in Washington, D. C., which he attended, described the method of voting. The state was divided into three counties with two principal cities in each. Election for city officers was held first with the elections for the county and state officers following.

"We gained far more knowledge about the workings of government during our trip to Washington than we could have gained going to school for six months," was the summary of Gunn's trip to Washington.

"We actually were in contact with the big men, such as in the Navy department, seeing Admirals Ernest King and Chester Nimitz and the War department's Robert W. Patterson." In addition to holding their mock primaries, and national conventions, the forum was conducted on tours through the Senate, FBI building and the Supreme Court. On the last day in Washington, Jack and members of the forum were introduced to President Truman.

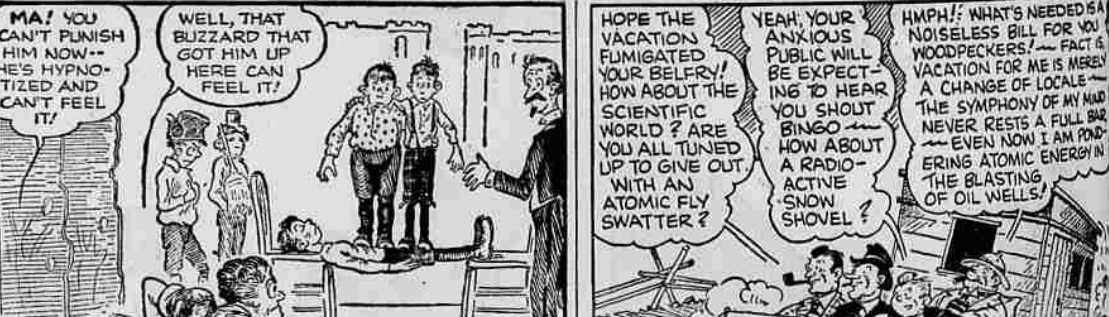

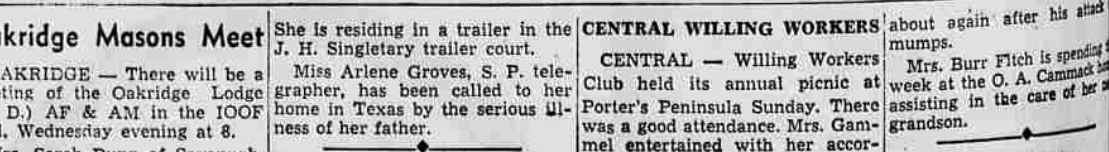
