### Recipe

Tuna Supreme

- 1 4-oz. can sliced mushrooms
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 1 cup milk
- 1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
- 1 7-oz. can tuna fish
- 2 tablespoons chopped parsley
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 eggs, well beaten

Drain the liquid from the mushrooms, saving it for the sauce, and saute mushrooms in butter. Blend in flour; gradually add milk and liquid from mushrooms; cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add crumbs, flaked tuna, parsley, salt, pepper and eggs. Pour into a buttered shallow baking dish. Place in a shallow pan of hot water and bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) about 40 minutes. Makes six servings.
