

Grove Closes Labor Day

COTTAGE GROVE—Local stores are to be closed Labor day, making a double holiday for nearly all of the merchants and awakening housewives to the need for looking ahead on food for the family.

The Cottage Grove Studio (photographic), which is in the Cottage Grove Hotel, was reopened Friday and Saturday, Aug. 30 and 31, with Mrs. Spies of Salem in charge, according to W. E. Klosterman, manager of the Bishop Moderne Studios, which have sponsored the venture. The former operator of the studios left unexpectedly without completing business accounts and Mrs. Spies is authorized to straighten out the difficulties.

School News

Pre-registration for union high school students here will be held Wednesday and Thursday of next week, Sept. 4 and 5, and all who possibly can do so are urged to enroll at that time, but actual class work begins Monday morning, Sept. 8. All who will be freshmen should register Wednesday afternoon from 2 to 4:30 p.m.; juniors Wednesday evening, 7 to 9 p.m.; sophomores, Thursday afternoon, 2 to 4:30 p.m.; seniors, Thursday evening, 7 to 9 p.m.

Student body fees will be collected at this time as follows: Book fees, \$1 per course; towel fees, \$1, and locker deposit, 50 cents. This means a total of \$5.50 for a student taking a course of four subjects with physical education and health. Student-body tickets will be sold at \$2.50 each. These will admit the student to all home athletic games, two pay assemblies, social events, and include a subscription to the school paper.

The course of study this year is being broadened somewhat with courses offered in aeronautics, commercial subjects, and instrumental music, with special emphasis upon science and health instruction.

It is hoped that students interested in playing band instruments will register in either beginning or advanced band, and anyone in the community having available band instruments to loan, rent or sell, should contact F. D. Hollister, band director, at

Principal Elmer Fleming of the grade schools announces that all children who are entering the first grade will be registered Wednesday morning, Sept. 4, in rooms 1 and 2 of the Adams Building, beginning at 9 a.m. In order to enter school for the first grade a child must be six years of age on or before Nov. 15, 1946, according to the Oregon school law. Each child must present birth certificate upon application for admission. At the registration Sept. 4, each child will be scheduled for the beginning first grade test which will be given Wednesday afternoon and all day Thursday, Sept. 4 and 5. Certificates showing physical examination should be on hand also.

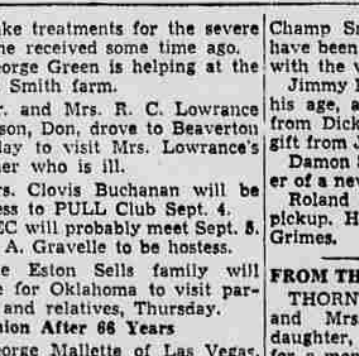

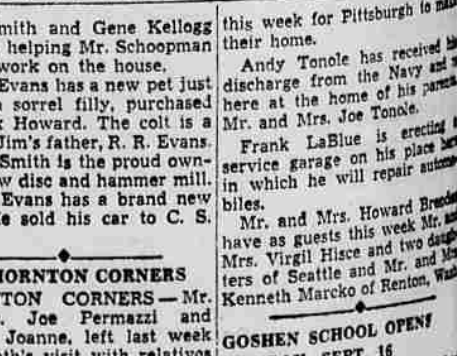
