Windsor Beats Hanauka In Finn. Mour. Duel

The Hills Creek Hillbillies of old, in a traditional prewar Donnybrook, upset the favored Snellstrom Braves 2-1 in ten innings before 2000 rabid spectators at Civic Stadium Friday night—taking the initial lead in the three-game series for the Cascade Baseball League pennant.

Unlike the old Swimmers' De-light park, the ten-foot wall was no barrier to the fans—or fan. He braved the "lions den" mid-way in the game by jumping down onto the field, but was persuaded to leave. After the contest was ended "Daniel" came down a roarin' and the fists started to fly—with not a single member of Eugene's well-dressed police department on the scene.

The skirmish had nothing to do with the contest, but will likely drum up trade for the second game of the series—Sunday at the Stadium, starting at 2:30 p.m.

The game was probably the best-played contest of the season, although the chips were down on a 60-40, winner-loser basis.

Windsor Does Superb Job

The Billies gave their ace hurler, Duke Windsor, perfect support and the big right-hander came through with a superb five-hit job that included seven strikeouts and not a single base on balls.

Bill Hanauka, the Braves speedburning right-hander, gave a creditable mound performance—allowing seven hits, fanning eight and walking three. Neither of his team's two errors proved costly and the Braves came up with one fine twin killing.

The Billies threatened in the first inning when Charley Mickelson collected his first and least important of two hits—a single that went through Pete Taylor in centerfield for a two-base error. But he failed to score. The Braves threatened in the third when Pete Taylor led off with a double, moved to third on Del Hoff's sacrifice, but was stranded there as Hanauka whiffed and Manager Al Lightner filed out sharply to center.

Hills Creek broke the ice in the fourth when Dick Wright, who was presented the league batting trophy by President Bill Green in a pre-game ceremony, smashed a double to the centerfield fence—after two were out. He scored on Homer Parks' two-bagger to deep right.

There was no more scoring until the seventh when George Walker led off with a line drive to deep left-center. The ball either cleared the fence to the right of the flagpole, bounced over the barrier, or rolled through the open gate. The umpires ruled it a home run and a lengthy protest followed—and was instrumental in the eventual "Daniel-lions" difficulties.

Mickelson Bats in Winning Run

Neither team threatened seriously until the top of the tenth when Jack Fassett walked and went to second on Del Koch's sacrifice bunt. Windsor fanned for the second out and then Mickelson sent a Texas-league single to short left-center, scoring Fassett with the winning run.

The Braves went down one-two-three in the last of the extra frame.

One of the most sensational plays of the game came in the eighth when Arland Schwab lined one high to third. Grover Kelsay went up for the ball and it bounced up from his glove, but the third-sacker retrieved it with his "meat" hand for the putout. Shortstop Ranny Smith made a nice play on Lightner's grounder behind second in the sixth, barely catching the Brave at first.

The Game was of real championship caliber.

In another unexpected outcome, the Carmichael, Calif., Firemen became the only undefeated team in the tournament when they handed the Waco, Texas, Dons an 8-7 defeat, their first of the event.
